<b>1 Cor. 10:1-2</b>	Unto Moses	Old Testament Jews	No one got wet	During the Exodus experience	No water	Deliverance from enemies
<b>Luke 3:1-8</b>	John the Baptist	Jews under the Old Covenant	Fruits of repentance necessary	In anticipation of the ministry of the Messiah	Water	Preparation for following Jesus under the Old Covenant
<b>Matt. 3:13-17</b>	Jesus	Jesus	The Father spoke and the Holy Spirit confirmed	At the initiation of His public Ministry	Water	To establish Him as after the order of Melchisedec (Hebrews 7:1-22)
<b>Acts 2:38</b> (Essentially same as Luke 3:1-8)	Peter/John the Baptist	Jews leaving Judaism for Christianity	They respond to the answer of “what must we do?”	At Pentecost with Jews from every nation (Acts 2:5)	Water	To show the departure from Judaism to Christianity
<b>Rom. 6:1-5; 1 Peter 3:21</b>	Death	New Testament Christians “picture” of their salvation	The distinction between the “New” and “Old” man.	During the “church age”	No water	To show others a picture of the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus Christ through one’s testimony
<b>Matt. 3:11; John 20:22</b>	Spirit	The “seal” and “guarantee” of one’s relationship with the Lord	No gifts or “manifestations” mentioned	At the moment one believes in Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Savior	No water	To allow one to become the temple of the Holy Spirit since the veil has been torn.

<b>Acts 8:27-39;</b> <b>Acts 16:26-33;</b> <b>Eph. 4:1</b>	Church	Those who professed faith in Jesus Christ	An act of obedience not belief	After one believes in Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Savior	Water	Baptism shows outwardly a demonstration of faith inwardly
<b>Matt. 3:12</b>	Fire	Those who believe not	Judgment takes place	Upon death of an unbeliever	No water	As a consequence to one's unbelief
