Some Summary Observations about Martha

- (1) Martha is the central person in our text, not Mary. Mary is the hero, she is the model, but she is not the dominant personality of our passage.
- (2) Martha was not jealous that Mary was spending time with Jesus, but angry that Mary was not helping her.
- (3) Martha does not see any problem with herself, but she blames those who are innocent of wrongdoing.
- (4) Martha's service was not wrong, but her attitude in that service.
- (5) Martha's frustration, anger, and temper tantrum may not be excusable, but it is at least understandable.
- (6) Martha's words reflect not only an anger, but a lack of reverence and a lack of submission.

Some summary observations about Martha.

- (1) Jesus did not respond to Martha's anger in anger.
- (2) Jesus found Martha's charges wrong on every count, and at the same time found Martha to be the one in the wrong.
- (3) Jesus' response was evidence of His refusal to superimpose some kind of stereotypical "woman's role" model on Mary and Martha alike.
- (4) Jesus dealt more with the attitudes of these women than He did their actions.
- (5) Jesus exposed a problem with Martha's priorities.
- (6) Jesus exposed a problem of responsibilities.
