"I Have Overcome the World!" John 16:29-33

Jesus graciously points His weak disciples to Himself.

(1) Their Claim to Understanding (29)

- An inflated view of their own perception

- of their ability to understand

1. The Weak Disciples

(2) Their Confession of Faith

2. The All-Sufficient Savior

(2) He Points Them to Himself (33)

-1- His Purpose to Settle and Assure them

"These things I have spoken to You that in Me you may have peace."

-2- His declaration of Triumph

"In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world."

[1] The context: The inevitability of tribulation in a fallen world

[2] His Triumph over the World

- A bold, audacious declaration!

"<u>1</u>" – emphatic "have overcome" Gk. Perfect tense

- The world overcome!

- But inadequate: It still needs to be filled out!

- Sincere, commendable - so far as it goes!

"His disciples said to Him,

"Now we are sure that You know all things,

and have no need that anyone should question You.

By this we believe that You came forth from God."

'See, now you are speaking plainly,

and using no figure of speech!""

vv. 29-30

vv. 31-33

(1) He Points Up Their Weakness (31-32)
-1- He warns them against an inflated view of their faith v. 31 "Do you now believe?"

-2- He foretells their imminent failure v. 32 "Indeed, the hour is coming, yes, has now come, that you will be scattered, each to his own, - They will be scattered! and will leave Me alone."

cf. Matt. 26:31ff; Zech. 13:7

- They will abandon Him – but He is not alone!

"And yet I am not alone, because the Father is with Me."

- Reason to rejoice!
