I. Introduction.

II. The LORD provides guidance in Keliah. v. 1-14

- A. David delivers Keliah from the Philistines. v. 1-5
 - 1. When Keliah is attacked, who should have come to their aid? v. 1 9:16
 - 2. David inquires of the LORD whether he should help Keliah. v. 2 30:8 II Sam. 2:5
 - 3. David overcomes the objections of his men. v. 3-4 15:24 Pr. 29
 - 4. The LORD gives David a great victory by which Keliah is delivered. v. 5
 - 5. This reminds us of Jesus.
 - a. He had compassion upon His people and delivered them at great cost.
 - b. He submitted to the Father's will. John 15:10 8:29 4:34
 - c. He had to overcome the doubts and objections of His disciples. Mt. 16:21-22 Mark 8:31ff Luke 18:31-34 Jo. 11:16
 - 6. We are called by God to go into a hostile world to offer deliverance. Mt. 28:19-20
- B. The LORD delivers David from Keliah. v. 6-14
 - 1. One would think that David could expect gratitude and loyalty.
 - 2. Saul thinks that the LORD has allowed David to be cornered. v. 7-8 II Sa. 20:15ff
 - 3. David inquires of the LORD through Abiathar the priest and the ephod. v. 6,9 Ex. 28:6ff 29:2ff Lev. 18:8 II Ki. 6:8ff
 - 4. David learns that if he stays, Saul will come and the leaders of Keliah will hand him over. v. 9-12
 - 5. David and his men make their escape. v. 13
 - 6. David, by departing, delivers Keliah again. v. 10
- C. The experience of David reflects the experience of Jesus the Son of David and our experience. Ps. 35:12ff 38:19-20 109:4-5,8 41:9
 - 1. Jesus, like David, was betrayed by those to whom He showed great love.

 Mark 5:15-17 John 10:31-32 8:40 6:70f Lu. 21:3-6 22:48 Mt. 26:14ff Ps. 41:9
 - 2. We who follow in Jesus' (and David's) steps will be used and betrayed by those whom we try to love (even professing believers!). II Ti. 4:16 Phil. 1:15ff Jo. 16:2
 - 3. We must put our ultimate trust in the LORD. Pr. 29:25 Jer. 17:5-8 II Ti. 4:17
- D. God knows all things, even what might have been. Mt. 11:20-24 26:24 II Ki. 13:19
 - 1. His plan, therefore, is the best possible plan. Eph. 1:11 Ro. 8:28 11:33-36 Pr. 4:11
 - 2. God knows how to deliver His people from troubles and temptations. I Co. 10:13
- E. How does God provide guidance for us? II Tim. 3:16-17 II Pe. 1:3 Heb. 4:14ff
- F. God calls us to go out into a hostile world to do spiritual battle. Mt. 5:13ff 28:19f

III. The LORD provides encouragement through Jonathan. v. 14-18

- A. Saul relentlessly pursues David, but the LORD does not let him succeed. v. 14-15
- B. The LORD sends Jonathan to build up David's faith. v. 16-18
 - 1. Jonathan strengthens David's hand in God. v. 16b-17 30:6
 - 2. Jonathan's encouragement is rooted in God's promises. 16:12-13
 - 3. David and Jonathan renew their covenant in what appears to be their last meeting. v. 18

- C. Jesus, Who is the fulfillment of God's promises, encourages us. Acts 13:23 Rom. 1:2 <u>II Co. 1:20</u> Gal. 3:16,29,14 Eph. 3:6 Mt. 11:28-31 28:20 <u>John 16:33</u>
- D. We ought to strengthen and encourage one another in the LORD. Heb. 3:13 Col. 4:8 I Th. 5:11,14 3:2 Acts 11:23
 - 1. We all need to be reminded of God's promises. Acts 2:23 I Co. 10:13 He. 13:5b-6 Js. 1:12 I Jo. 2:25 II Pe. 1:4 3:9-13 II Co. 1:20
 - 2. Sometimes God sends a Jonathan when we most need help. Pr. 18:24b
 - 3. Are you a Jonathan-like encourager? Acts 4:36 9:27 Phil. 4:19 Ps. 30:5 Pr. 25:11
 - 4. Sometimes those who have encouraged others need to be encouraged. v. 17 22:23
 - 5. We are encouraged by those who remain faithful to God in the midst of suffering. Js. 5:10 Heb. 11:1ff

IV. The LORD provides a providential deliverance in Zith. v. 19-29

- A. The Ziphites offer to surrender David to Saul. v. 19-23
 - 1. This, too, is an act of betrayal. v. 19-20
 - 2. Saul again demonstrates his self-centered religious hypocrisy. v. 21,7 15:13
 - 3. Evil religious hypocrites still invoke the name and favor of God. Dt. 5:11
 - 4. Saul is still trusting in men, not God his own devices and his minions. v. 22-23
- B. Saul and his army chase David and his men. v. 24-26
- C. At the last possible moment Saul is called away precise providence. v. 27-29
 - 1. This is not coincidental. v. 27
 - 2. God sovereignly uses the evil Philistines to serve His purpose. Ge. 50:20 Acts 2:23
 - 3. God's deliverance is memorialized in the name of the rock. v. 28
 - 4. David goes to Engedi.
 - 5. Why doesn't David punish these cities which betrayed him? Ro. 12:19
- D. David writes a Psalm about the betrayal of the Ziphites. Ps. 54
 - 1. He cries out for deliverance. v. 1-3
 - 2. He trusts God to protect him and to punish the evildoers. v. 4-5
 - 3. He offers praise to God, his Deliverer.

V. Concluding applications.

- A. God still helps and delivers His people in many ways.
- B. There was only one way God could deliver us from sin and death: through the cross of Christ. Mt. 26:39-46 Heb. 2:17 I Pe. 3:18
