"Do This in Remembrance of Me."
1 Corinthians 11:23-34
Reading: John 6:47-58

The **last time** we gathered for the **Lord's Supper** was **March 8** (7 months)!

Not long after, we stopped almost **all** of our ministry.

Public worship was reduced to a **45 minute video** of a "skinnyed down" service posted on FaceBook every Sunday morning.

But over the summer, we slowly began to **open up** the church.

We learned it was easier to **shut down** a ministry all at once...

Than it is to **open it up** all at once!

But we are **getting there!**

This morning we are gathered, **at last**, to *remember* and *celebrate* Jesus' death for us.

Turn w/ me to 1 Corinthians 11:23-33 (read).

This morning, in the *Lord's Supper*, we are again *reminded* that Jesus Christ *died in the place of sinners*.

- 1. What is the *meaning* of the Lord's Supper?
- 2. What are its *mechanics*?

The Lord's Supper *reminds* us that Jesus *died* for us.

- 1. In a few minutes, we *share* a memory. We will all become actors in the **NT church**'s *great reminder* of our Lord's love for His Church.
- 2. What does this *table* and this *time mean* ("significance")...? Beloved, you must never *come* to this table and *take* its elements w/o *reflecting* on its *meaning*!
 - a. *First*, let's think through **two** theology words often used to describe the Lord's Supper: *sacrament* and *memorial*.
 - i. A *memorial* helps you remember a person or action.
 - ii. A *sacrament* is a practice said to be used by God to give *special grace* as you perform it.
 - iii. The Lord's Supper is a memorial, **not** a sacrament!
 - 1. These two elements do **not** impart *saving* or *sanctifying* (*holiness*) grace.
 - 2. <u>Some</u> say the bread & cup communicate *saving* grace. **No** that's nowhere in the **NT**.
 - 3. <u>Some</u> say God uses these elements to mysteriously provide *strengthening grace* (Presbyt). That's even gaining ground among *Baptists*.
 - 4. No again, there just isn't any text for that.
 - 5. The Lord's Supper is **w/o** question, however, an occasion for great *encouragement & joy*.

- b. Let's list **6** actions (1 Cor 11) that help us understand the *significance* of the Lord's Supper, then *drill down* on **two** of them:
 - i. ... obeying (24- do this), remembering (memorial! 24,25 in remembrance), proclaiming (26), anticipating (26 until He comes), examining (28-32), gathering (33-come together).
 - ii. For this morning, we'll examine *remembering* & *examining*.
- 3. Do you **post** pictures on social media? How many pictures do you have stored on the **cloud**!?! There is *no denying* the power of *just the right* picture. *Pictures & symbols* bring *memories & messages* back into our minds.
 - a. The NT is teaching us that this **bread** & this **cup** paints a powerful picture of His *death on the Cross* in the place of sinners!
 - b. This **bread** is a *picture*; it provokes our *memory*. Look at **vv.** 23 & 24 w/me. (**Read**)
 - i. "This is My body"...Christ's body betrayed, beaten, scourged, spat on, crucified, bleeding, pierced, dying forsaken, dead. Bearing our sins in His body on the Cross.
 - ii. V. 24 "...which is for you; do this in remembrance of Me."
 - iii. Jesus' command "do this in remembrance of Me" suggests both reflecting on and even celebrating His death for us...as we take the bread!

- c. The **cup** we'll share is also a picture (**read v. 25**). Our Lord Jesus' **blood** − poured out → words that sum up His willing death for sinners (**NT** − "blood of Jesus," shorthand, death of Jesus).
 - i. Paul makes it plain for us in v. 26 the *bread* & the *cup* are a picture of Jesus' **death**. "Do this" (**eat**)..."do this" (**drink**)...for...as often as you **eat** this bread & drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until He comes.
 - ii. Here, at this table, is the Church's powerful reminder of the sin-paying death of our Redeemer.
- 4. Jesus calls us to *remember* (*celebrate*) & He also commands you to *examine yourself* before coming to the table. Follow as I <u>read vv.</u> <u>27-32.</u>
 - a. Jesus' admonition to eat & drink mindfully is followed by His warning to eat & drink very carefully. Let's capture the apostle's concern w/3 words: warning, risk, remedy
 - b. Paul sounds a *warning*. **Don't** put this *bread* in your mouth & press this *cup* to your lips, in a manner that is *unworthy* of Christ!
 - i. In the **context** of ch.11, the *wealthy* Corinthians used the Lord's Supper as an opportunity to *eat* in front of the poor, and *drink* until they were drunk!
 - ii. Their attitudes of *pride & selfishness & recklessness* help us understand that "*unworthy*" (27) suggests coming to this table w/ attitudes that are *careless & unloving & proud*.

- c. Paul speaks of the *risk* (29-30). This memorial is so important that *disdaining* the Lord's Supper invites *illness & death*.
 - i. Beloved, *be careful* this morning! This *bread & cup* are **not** for willful, unrepentant *sinners*, whether they call themselves *Christians or not*! (pause)
- d. So what do you do...? Here is Paul's remedy in v. 28. Examine your attitudes & motives before you eat & drink the bread & cup.
 - i. And the right question is *not*: *am I perfect*? Rather: *am I here in reverence for Christ & at peace w/ my brother*?
 - ii. Not: am I perfect?, but are you genuinely striving to live faithfully?

- 5. Unpacking the *meaning* of the Lord's Supper has already yielded its *mechanics*. The moving parts are *simple*: *bread*, *cup*, *congregation*.
 - a. The *bread*. A **symbol** of Jesus' *crucified body* (**24**). Jesus identified Himself (John 6) as the *Bread of Life*!
 - b. The *cup*. A **symbol** of the *New Covenant* (25). The *New Covenant* is God's *binding promise* to make us *new people* though faith in Jesus. Christ's *blood* (death) **activated** that promise!
 - i. The *bread* & the *cup* picture our Savior's death for us. And they picture that *new life* is only possible when your faith is such that He becomes *life itself* to you (**John 6**)...
 - ii. Jesus said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you have no life in yourselves. He who eats My flesh & drinks My blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day. For My flesh is true food & My blood is true drink. He who eats My flesh & drinks My blood abides in Me, & I in him."
 - c. Church family! This table is for the gathered & celebrating & self-examined saints (2X). The Lord's Supper is intended for men & women who have turned to Christ & placed their trust in Him His followers. You... Me...

Jesus said, "Take, eat; this is My body. Drink from it, all of you."

The **central message** of the Bible is a *love story*. A story of *God's love* for the *unworthy*. We call that story the *Gospel* (*Good News*).

The Gospel is an **illustrated** *love story*; the *Lord's Table* pictures the love of Christ for sinners. I'd like to conclude by **reminding** you of that *Love Story*...

Who are you? Where do you come from? ... Do you think about that?

The *Bible* has the answer! *God created* you! (Gen 1:1)

There's so much we could say about *just that*, but let's focus on this: because God *created you*, He *owns you* ("accountability"; logical!).

How are you doing? Maybe you think you're doing *okay* (maybe *not*). The Bible says if you're **not** living *completely* the way God requires, you're in *rebellion*.

No-one lives in complete obedience; no one really *wants* to! (Rom 3:10-12)

That's *bad* for you, because you're *accountable* to God.

What does a holy God do w/ sinners (rebels)? **Death & judgment.** (Heb 9:27).

That is *bad news*, but it's not the *only* news!

For God so loved the World that He gave His only begotten Son. God sent His Son, Jesus, into the world, to become the sinless man, to rescue sinners.

Jesus lived a *completely perfect* (*sinless*) life. Then He willingly *died* a criminal's death. **Why?** *In the place* of, and *suffering punishment for*, sinners (rebels). "*In our place, for our sins!*"

Where is He now? What happens next? He's not in that grave!

God *raised* Jesus from the dead on the 3^{rd} Day (NT \rightarrow *Resurrection*).

The *Resurrection proves* that God *accepts* Jesus' payment for sins. The resurrection *also* proves that Death has been *conquered*.

So Jesus is alive *right now*! He is *Lord* of His Church. He is the *Savior* who gives *eternal life* to His own. He has promised to *return* as *Rescuer & King & Judge*.

(small pause)

The Gospel leaves every man & women with a choice to make.

To continue in *rebellion* (your way instead of your King's).

Or...to turn to the Lord Jesus in *repentance & faith*:

Repentance (→ *turning/submission*). Turning from *your* way and turning to *Christ* & submitting to His *good* & *loving rule*.

Faith $(\rightarrow trust)$. Trust that Jesus' death on the Cross is true & is enough. All that God requires in payment for all of your sins.

The result? God's gift of forgiveness & new life in Christ!

Will you believe Him? ...turn to Him? ...trust Him? ...follow Him?

You must!

Come to Christ, and join us at the table!

The deacons will come & we will share in the Lord's Supper. We will **examine** & we will **remember...**
