"There is no substitute for spiritual worship. It is the unique right, the sole property, and the exclusive privilege of God Himself and He will not tolerate any rival. Idolatry, in its essence, is simply that by which man seeks to displace God, or which attempts to relegate Him to a position of secondary importance. An idol is anything that a man worships in his heart, to the exclusion of God"p.47

Chapter 6 II. Importance of Worship

*First three: Voluntary, sweet savor for sins against God

Burnt: olah=ascend upwards. Christ giving himself as a whole burnt offering on the cross Eph. 5;2, Heb. 9:14, Heb.2:17. Clean domesticated animals were used picturing Christ being meek and lowly in heart. The voluntary nature of the burnt offering speaks of Christ's willingness to leave the glories of heaven, be born and live as a man, and freely give himself to die on the cross for the sins of the world. Phil 2:5-8; Heb. 10:5-7 God wants believers to give their best, whether it is talent or treasure. God does not want us to offer that which costs us nothing, as many did in Israel. Mal 1;7-8,13. Believers are to give as God has prospered them 1Cor 16:1,2; and in a cheerful manner 2 Cor 9:7

Meal: minchah=gift. Christ was the corn of wheat bruised on the mill of Calvary and offered as the bread of life to his people. John 12:24 Labor went into the preparation of the meal offerings. The meal had to be crushed, ground and sifted 13 X to become fine flour, picturing Christ's ministry. Fine flour speaks of the evenness and uniformity of the Lord's character and service. He was scourged and crucified for the sins of mankind. During his earthly ministry, Jesus went through the sifting process of Satan's temptation and the religious leaders' testing, yet no sin was found in Him. The uncooked flour pictures the labor of the Israelites. They had to plant, water, weed, harvest, crush grind and sift the grain before offering it to the lord. For the labors of Christians to be accepted and blessed by the Lord, they must be presented with pure motives, in love, and in the power of the Holy spirit. Second form cakes pictured the believer going a step farther in service for the Lord. The green ears of grain were the third form, picturing Jn 12:24

Peace: shelamin= Christ is our peace offering, Lord supper Rom 5;1, Col 1:20

First it represented sacrificial gifts brought by the Israelites in thanksgiving for the peace, friendship and fellowship they experienced with God. Second the peace offering, after it had been presented to the lord,

provided a fellowship meal that the Israelites and the priests joyfully shared before the Lord. God's portion having been burned on the altar.

Christ: Guides in way of peace Lk 1:78-79; angels proclaim Lk 2:14; Bestowed peace on those he healed Mk 5:34 and forgave Lk 7:50. Near the end of his ministry, Christ stood looking over Jerusalem, as tears streamed down his cheeks, and said, "If you had known, even you, especially in this your day, the things that make for your peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes. Luke 19:42 they had missed their day of peace through him. 2 Corinthians 5:19 namely, that God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and He has committed to us the world of reconciliation.

Last two: Compulsory, Sins against God and man

Sin: chattah = miss the mark or err from God's way. Christ is our sin offering. Sins against God. 2 Cor 5:21; 1Peter 2:24; Romans 8:3 For what the Law could not do, weak as it was through the flesh, God did: sending His own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh and as an offering for sin, He condemned sin in the flesh,

Trespass: asham= gullt Infringing on or violating rights of others or God. God Christ is our trespass offering Col 2:13,14; 2 Cor 5:19






5. In the vision of Isaiah "One of the seraphim flew and touched Isaiah's mouth with a live, hot coal as a symbol of cleansing. When he was thus purged and made clean; the Lord was ready to use him, and he was available (v. 8). Some might think that Isaiah did not have a very good self-image. He was not thinking positively; he was not affirming his strengths. Surely, Isaiah knew that he had the best

mouth in the land! He was a prophet of God! He was the foremost spiritual leader in the nation. And yet he cursed himself. Why? The answer is very clear. We find it in the words "my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts" (v. 5). Isaiah had seen a vision of God in His holiness, and he was absolutely shattered to the very core of his being by a sense of his own sinfulness. His heart longed for purging."-John MacArthur


READ: Hebrews 10:22-24 let us draw near with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith, having our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water.
