The Hero of the Shade Tree God's Lesson on Obedience WHY DID GOD ASK THIS QUESTION?

Two Observations;

1 Jonah cared more about his personal comforthan for the 120,000 people of Nineveh.

2 Jonah cared moreabout the plant / vine than for the 120,000 people of Nineveh. He had a divided heart

¹⁰Then said the LORD, Thou hast had pity on the gourd, for the which thou hast not laboured, neither madest it grow; which came up in a night, and perished in a night:

¹⁰ The LORD said to him, "This plant grew up in one night and disappeared the next; you didn't do anything for it and you didn't make it grow —yet you feel sorry for it! (TEV)

The Hero of the Shade Tree Two Corresponding Truths for Hero's

- God's offers you the <u>same mercy</u> He Offers Everyone Else.
- 2. God Offers Everyone Else the <u>same Mercy</u> He Offers You.

Application for all you Hero's

- 1. God's Judgment comes with a Contingency Plan.
- 2. God is Ready to show everyone the same Mercy He has Shown you.
- 3. God wants His people to get their Priorities Straight.
