The Sermon Pastor

"Paul's Testimony: Hopeful Obedience" Acts 26:1-32

So Agrippa said to Paul, "You have permission to speak for yourself." Then Paul stretched out his hand and made his defense:

- ² "I consider myself fortunate that it is before you, King Agrippa, I am going to make my defense today against all the accusations of the Jews, ³ especially because you are familiar with all the customs and controversies of the Jews. Therefore I beg you to listen to me patiently.
- ⁴ "My manner of life from my youth, spent from the beginning among my own nation and in Jerusalem, is known by all the Jews. ⁵ They have known for a long time, if they are willing to testify, that according to the strictest party of our religion I have lived as a Pharisee. ⁶ And now I stand here on trial because of my hope in the promise made by God to our fathers, ⁷ to which our twelve tribes hope to attain, as they earnestly worship night and day. And for this hope I am accused by Jews, O king! ⁸ Why is it thought incredible by any of you that God raises the dead?
- ⁹ "I myself was convinced that I ought to do many things in opposing the name of Jesus of Nazareth. ¹⁰ And I did so in Jerusalem. I not only locked up many of the saints in prison after receiving authority from the chief priests, but when they were put to death I cast my vote against them. ¹¹ And I punished them often in all the synagogues and tried to make them blaspheme, and in raging fury against them I persecuted them even to foreign cities.
- 12 "In this connection I journeyed to Damascus with the authority and commission of the chief priests. 13 At midday, O king, I saw on the way a light from heaven, brighter than the sun, that shone around me and those who journeyed with me. 14 And when we had all fallen to the ground, I heard a voice saying to me in the Hebrew language, 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me? It is hard for you to kick against the goads.' 15 And I said, 'Who are you, Lord?' And the Lord said, 'I am Jesus whom you are persecuting. 16 But rise and stand upon your feet, for I have appeared to you for this purpose, to appoint you as a servant and witness to the things in which you have seen me and to those in which I will appear to you, 17 delivering you from your people and from the Gentiles—to whom I am sending you 18 to open their eyes, so that they may turn from darkness to light and from the power of Satan to God, that they may

receive forgiveness of sins and a place among those who are sanctified by faith in me.'

¹⁹ "Therefore, O King Agrippa, I was not disobedient to the heavenly vision, ²⁰ but declared first to those in Damascus, then in Jerusalem and throughout all the region of Judea, and also to the Gentiles, that they should repent and turn to God, performing deeds in keeping with their repentance. ²¹ For this reason the Jews seized me in the temple and tried to kill me. ²² To this day I have had the help that comes from God, and so I stand here testifying both to small and great, saying nothing but what the prophets and Moses said would come to pass: ²³ that the Christ must suffer and that, by being the first to rise from the dead, he would proclaim light both to our people and to the Gentiles."

²⁴ And as he was saying these things in his defense, Festus said with a loud voice, "Paul, you are out of your mind; your great learning is driving you out of your mind." ²⁵ But Paul said, "I am not out of my mind, most excellent Festus, but I am speaking true and rational words. ²⁶ For the king knows about these things, and to him I speak boldly. For I am persuaded that none of these things has escaped his notice, for this has not been done in a corner. ²⁷ King Agrippa, do you believe the prophets? I know that you believe." ²⁸ And Agrippa said to Paul, "In a short time would you persuade me to be a Christian?" ²⁹ And Paul said, "Whether short or long, I would to God that not only you but also all who hear me this day might become such as I am—except for these chains."

³⁰ Then the king rose, and the governor and Bernice and those who were sitting with them. ³¹ And when they had withdrawn, they said to one another, "This man is doing nothing to deserve death or imprisonment." ³² And Agrippa said to Festus, "This man could have been set free if he had not appealed to Caesar."

Morning Worship Service:

Acts 26: 1 - 32

Paul's Testimony: Hopeful Obedience

1. Pau	l Is On	Trial fo	or His	Hope in	God's	Promise	(1-8)	١.
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2. Paul Testifies to the Risen Jesus Who Delivers from Sin (9-23).

3. How Did Festus and Agrippa Respond? (24-32)

CONCLUSION: Paul is giving his defense of his belief in the risen Lord Jesus. He makes the case that everything he is doing completely makes sense in light of the resurrection of Jesus. His words are convicting. So much so that Festus declares that he is crazy and Agrippa withdraws to avoid conversion. What about you? Is the resurrection of Jesus your only hope? And if He is our only hope are we living our whole lives in conformity with that truth?

Why surprised? The Resurrection is the central hope of Judaism.

- ²⁵ Whom have I in heaven but you?

Taking Gathered Worship Home

How would you summarize Christianity? One way is living in light of the hope of Christ's resurrection. This week we see Paul giving expression to this hope as central to everything that it means to trust in Jesus. Let's look deeper into what he means and how we might do the same.

Please use the devotional material below each day this week to praise Christ. Ask Jesus to teach us His ways that we may walk in them to accomplish His purposes.

Sunday Morning

READ Acts 26:1-32; Job 19:25-27; Psalm 73:23-26; Isaiah 26:19-21; Daniel 12:1-2; First Corinthians 1:18-25. DISCUSS Why is the resurrection so central to Judaism/Christianity? How are you depending on Jesus alone? MEDITATE on Matthew 22:29-33. PRAY "Lord Jesus, You alone have conquered death. We praise You!"

Sunday Evening

Come join the Young Adults' Fellowship tonight at 6pm. Pray for them!

Monday

READ Acts 26:1-32; Job 19:25-27; Psalm 17:15; First John 3:1-3. DISCUSS What does it mean "And after my skin has been thus destroyed, yet in my flesh I shall see God"? When is the Psalmist expecting to see God? What has yet to be revealed? What does John's hope lead him to do? Why? MEDITATE on Matthew 22:29-33. PRAY "Lord Jesus, thank You for Your promise to return for us. We long to see You face-to-face and to be transformed into Your likeness when we will sin no more. Allow this hope to drive us always."

Tuesday

READ Acts 26:1-32; Psalm 16:9-11; 49:14-15; 73:23-26. DISCUSS How is the Psalmist's hope in the resurrection central to his song? How does this same hope inform what you do? What other false hopes compete for your trust? MEDITATE on Matthew 22:29-33. PRAY "Lord, keep us from bowing to idols. Teach us to trust in You alone with all that we think, say, and do."

Wednesday

READ Acts 26:1-32; Isaiah 26:19-21; Daniel 3:1-2. DISCUSS Everyone who has ever lived will be raised, either to eternal life or everlasting death. Why? How does this provide hope? Terror? How does Jesus make all the difference? MEDITATE on Matthew 22:29-33. PRAY "Lord, You are the Judge of all the earth. You have created all that there is and we will all answer You with our lives. Have mercy on us, we pray."

Thursday

READ Acts 26:1-32; First Corinthians 1:18-25; Colossians 2:1-10. DISCUSS How does the world tend to reckon wisdom? How does God see wisdom differently? How does God use the foolish things of this world to show His wisdom? How are you living in resurrection power today? MEDITATE on Matthew 22:29-33. PRAY "Jesus, help us to trust You in life and death."

Friday

READ Acts 26:1-32; Job 19:25-27; Psalm 73:23-26; Isaiah 26:19-21; Daniel 12:1-2; First Corinthians 1:18-25. DISCUSS What have you been learning from these passages this week? REPENT of ways that you don't obey Christ's Word! MEDITATE on Matthew 22:29-33. PRAY for FCCW.

Saturday

PREPARE today for the worship service tomorrow. READ **Acts 27:1-28:31**. Invite others to join you for either *in-person or live-stream service* tomorrow. Ask Jesus to empower us with His life.

Matthew 22:29-33

But Jesus answered them, "You are wrong, because you know neither the Scriptures nor the power of God. For in the resurrection they neither marry nor are given in marriage, but are like angels in heaven. And as for the resurrection of the dead, have you not read what was said to you by God: 'I am the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob'? He is not God of the dead, but of the living." And when the crowd heard it, they were astonished at his teaching.
