B. The Invitation (v 22-25)

Paul gives three invitations using the phrase 'let us'.

- v 22 let us draw near instead of departing Hebrews 3:12
- v 23 let us hold fast ...our faith not wavering 2 Peter 3:17
- v 24 *let us consider one another* our faith is not a selfish faith. It is to be shared in the community of believers. That's called *fellowship* 1 John 1:7

"Believers need to come together today. We need to draw together in love and worship our Saviour in a local church.

These three let us verses invite us to:

Draw near in faith - toward God

Draw near in hope - for ourselves

Draw near in charity - with others " J.

v 23-25 = the steadfast *faithful*: who honour worship *assembly* Zeph 2:1-3 [these are the *spiritual*, growing saints]

v 25 = the backslider (apostate believer) : when they forsake the assembly

the cause = Heb 3:13

the consequence = 1 Tim 1:19

the call = 2 Cor 13:5

truth: the faith of Christ makes a new creature (2 Cor 5:17)

When Christ saves a sinner, he delivers him from the *prince of this world,* Jn 12:31 and the *dominion of sin,* Rom 6:14

C. The Exhortation (v 26-39)

Paul's exhortation is aimed at two groups :

(1) the *wilfull* unbeliever - one who will not believe God's word v 26-31 OT example of v 28 = Numbers 15:32 (note v 30-31)

Today, the *wilfull* unbeliever has heard the gospel; NT promise = John 16:7-14 God is faithful; men have heard the truth - John 1:9 but they do ... *despite to the Spirit of grace*, v 29

The consequence - v 30-31 & v 26-27 2 Thes 1:8-9

(2) the believer willing to endure afflictions,

v 32-39

These Christians were willing to suffer individual *reproach* and the loss of personal property (*spoiling of goods*, v 34). They also courageously identified with other believers who were persecuted and imprisoned, like Paul (v 33-34).

"The secret to their victory was *faith* (v 38) and *patience* (v 36).

The companion of faith is patience (Heb 6:12).

This combination is the key to *companionship* (v 33), continuance (v 34), *confidence* (v 35) and *the promise*, which is *reward* (v 35-36).

The just shall live by faith (v 38). This is a quote from <code>Habakkuk 2:4</code> This phrase is repeated three times in the New Testament: Rom 1:17, Gal 3:11, & Heb. Romans focuses on 'the just'; where Paul teaches justification.

Galatians emphasizes 'shall live'; where Paul shows how to live in the Spirit. Hebrews explains that <code>faith</code> is the foundation; this is the theme of chapters 11-13. God says the Christian who lives by faith will "go on unto perfection" (Heb 6:1). But the believer who "walks by sight" (2 Cor 5:7) will draw back (v 38, & 25). Dr. Wiersbe wrote: "In my own pastoral ministry, I have met many people who turned their backs on God's will and spent years 'wandering in the wilderness' (like Israel). But we can be confident! As we walk by faith, our Great High Priest will guide and perfect us!!"

v 39 ...we are not of them who draw back unto perdition = the lost (v 29) but of them that believe to the saving of the soul = the saints (1 Cor 1:2)
