What motivated the people to build the tower (11:4)? How did their desire conflict with God's revealed will (9:1)? In what ways might we be guilty of similar motives (Jam.4:13-17)?

What is the Biblical alternative to making a name for ourselves (12:2)? Which of these two paths describes your life?

What was the basis of their unity (11:4; see Rev.13)? Why do all human efforts to achieve world unity fall short of what God desires?

Why did God have to come "down to see the city and the tower" (Ps.113:4-6)? What does God's assessment of these tower builders (11:6) teach us about the heart of man, and about God?

Why was the confusing of their languages an effective way for scattering people over the face of the whole earth? How was God's judgment on them tempered with mercy (compare Gen.6-9)?

If God has ever humbled you by scattering your plans, what did you learn about His character from that experience?
