

Comforting brings:

I. Hope – "we trust that He will yet deliver us" (vs. 8-10)

It's about:

- A. Despair "we despaired even of life"
- B. Dependence -"we should not trust in ourselves but in God"
- C. Deliverance "Who delivered us from so great a death"

II. Help - "Ye also helping together"

It's about:

- A. People "by the means of many persons"
- **B.** Prayers "by prayer for us"
- C. Praise "thanks may be given by many on our behalf"
- III. Honor "ye have acknowledged us" (vs. 12-14)

It's about:

- A. Conscience "the testimony of our conscience"
- **B.** Conduct "we have had our conversation in the world"
- C. Camaraderie "we are your rejoicing... as ye also are ours"
