2 Chron 33:1-20 MANASSEH and REPENTANCE

Here is one of the loveliest and encouraging parts of Scripture! If ever there was a wicked king, it was this man. Yet he found mercy and was a saved man despite the awful things that he did.

Manasseh was only **12 years old** when he began to reign! Of course he would have had **advisors** – and I am not sure how far that went – what 'authority/power did an under-age king actually have? Could he demand what he wanted for breakfast, never mind, politically?

Over-all, it seems that the **general** testimony of his reign was that "he did what was evil in the sight of the Lord" – his conversion coming late in his reign, but not too late to **prove it was genuine!**

Notice it was evil because he followed "the abominations of the nations which the Lord drove out before the people of Israel"[2]! For him, despite his godly father, the cue was to keep looking at the nations around him – he had to be like **them**. They were the 'leaders' and 'examples' he wanted to follow. He therefore **respected** them and they were, his 'gods'. What we **admire** and **seek** is our 'god'!

Notice too, that although the writer tells us all that his father Hezekiah had done in the way of **reforming** the nation by demolishing the high places of worship and driving out the false gods, etc, this work was the attributed to "the **Lord**..."[2]. The author sees God as the real and ultimate Doer of all that happens! —

HIS PARTICULAR EVILS

The <u>first</u> was that he "<u>rebuilt</u> the high places which his father Hezekiah had demolished" [3]. He diametrically <u>reversed</u> what was right and good – after having lived under them! It is one thing to <u>initiate</u> and 'try, experiment' and 'test' a way of life, it is another thing to <u>reject</u> a way of life having enjoyed its blessings and then to <u>reverse</u> the principles! Manasseh would have <u>enjoyed</u> the fruit of all the <u>blessings</u> of chapter 30 (his father's reforms) and how the whole land <u>rejoiced!</u> So in <u>spite of that</u> Manasseh <u>chose</u> to <u>reject</u> and <u>reverse</u> the reforms his father had made

APP What is particularly sad about our own sins as a nation, is that we too **have had** spiritual blessings at the Reformation. We are not a pagan country but a country that has enjoyed the blessing of God! And what is happening now in the many changes in the law is that it is a **rejection** of the past reforms. When a child does something dangerous or wicked for the **first** time, you **explain** to him the wrongness of it! He was **ignorant** of its wrong. When he does it the 2nd time, you punish him because he has sinned **against knowledge** (he was **not** ignorant but **disobedient**)! There's a difference. Our nation knows the Bible and has chosen to **reject** its authority.

Then secondly, he introduced sins against the sanctuary! "he rebuilt the high places that his father Hezekiah had broken down... the carved image of the idol that he had made, he set in the house of God" [3-7] Ie, he sinned against 'holy things'. It was bad enough to make an idol, which itself was a direct breech of God's command, but to put it in God's temple was provoking/aggravating the sin. It was adding insult to injury! He was trying to be as provocative as possible! He was trying his hardest to be as insulting as possible!

Then thirdly, "He burned his sons as an offering" [6]! Can you think of anything more perverted? Offering someone else to suffer – and the more that person suffered the better the sacrifice! And that someone else your own innocent child! Imagine watching your child wriggle squirm in agony in fire! False gods are cruel! People complain about the commands of the only living and true God – but you know false gods demand far worse things! Satan is a hard master! If the other nations did it, then Manasseh wanted to be up there in the same league! APP There is no end to what such people will do in order to be seen to be one of the party members. Europe!!

Then <u>fourthly</u>, he <u>led</u> the nation <u>astray</u>! He was the <u>cause</u>, he was the <u>reason</u> Judah went from bad to worse. "Manasseh <u>led</u> Judah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem <u>astray</u>, to do <u>more evil</u> than the nations whom the Lord destroyed"[9]! To sin for one self is bad enough, but to be <u>responsible</u> for <u>making others</u> sin too, is <u>worse</u>! <u>APP</u> To be in a position of 'leading' others is a <u>great responsibility</u>! That is,

parents, teachers, elders, managers, employers, etc, involves accountability! To 'lead' is to <u>use your position</u> to influence in the slightest degree those under you! As parents we are supposed to use our position to influence our covenant privileges! It's the way God has chosen to further His cause **Psalm** 78!!

Finally, perhaps the greatest of all — "the Lord spoke to Manasseh and his people but they paid no attention" [10]! This seems to be something 'special'! It doesn't tell us how God spoke to him. But that doesn't matter. The Word of God doesn't lie - God spoke to Manasseh. Probably thru prophets. This happened often! We read in this book "Yet He sent prophets among them to brting them back to the Lord. Thes testified against the them, they would not pay attention" [24:19]! + Jer put it this way: "From the day that your fathers came out of the land of Egypt to this day, I have persistently sent all My servants the prophets to them day after day. Yet they did not listen to Me" [Jer 7:25,26] APP God still speaks to people today!

MANASSEH'S REPENTANCE

God sent judgment to Manasseh! "Therefore the Lord brought upon them...the king of Assyria, who captured Manasseh with hooks and bound him with chains" [11]! Judgment can be a good thing! It is very often designed to bring repentance! The whole book of Judges is about the cycle of Israel repenting > blessing > sinning > judgment + repenting > blessing > sinning > judgment repeatedly!

I am sure this was **not** the **first** time Manasseh experienced judgment for his sins! Perhaps some of the ways God 'spoke' to him was by judgment! "And when he was in distress he entreated the favour of the his God and humbled himself greatly before the God of his fathers" [12]! That is marvellous! That this man who blatantly provoked God, is now **seeking His favour!** Amazing! So, **what** made the **difference** this time? The **Holy Spirit!** It's always the Holy Spirit that makes a person truly repentant!

Note: there is **no true repentance** without **distress** over our sins! Many Xn counsellors today say to unbelievers who have no

understanding of the gospel, 'Let Jesus into your heart'! But that is not a Biblical phrase! What is needed is **repentance** for our sins! Christ's said "The kingdom of God is at hand, repent and believe the gospel" [Mar 1:15]. John Baptist as the **precursor** to Jesus "Repent and bring forth fruit for repentance" [Mat 3:8] Jesus "I am not come to call the righteous but sinners to repentance" [Mat 9:13]

When the Philippian Jailer was told to believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, he was **already filled** with remorse and distress over his sins! It was **because** he was repentant that he was **desperate** for something else – although he was **not** have been able **articulate** what that was. What he was needing, was – Christ!!

People are not called to **repentance** today as they should. "**Except** you **repent** you (disciples) shall all likewise perish"! We need to repent **daily** – for we sin daily! A Xn that does not repent daily is not looking at His Saviour daily in the eyes! Peter: "I am a sinful man"!

Now we come to a **beautiful** passage - when Manesseh prayed to God, "God was <u>moved</u> by his entreaty" [twice mentioned 13 & 19]! Imagine that in heaven – God 'moved' by our earnest prayer! What **encouragement**! We can move God by our prayers! We know God can be "moved to jealousy" [Deu 32:21] but he can also, like His dear Son, be "moved with compassion" [Mar 1:41]! The reason God is not moved with compassion more, is that <u>we</u> have not repented!

Manasseh's repentance was real/genuine/sincere! How do we know he truly repented? The proof of the pudding "he took away the foreign gods and the idol from the house of the Lord" [15] + "he also restored the altar of the Lord...he commanded Judah to serve the Lord" [16]. A changed life! That is always the true test. Ninevites! "When God saw what they did and how they turned from their evil way, God relented" and "did not" bring the judgment on them! [Jon 3:10] God completely/totally forgave Manasseh! 100% forgiveness - never to be remembered again! APP What God can compare to this God? Friends, the 'gods' of this world, do not have mercy and love like this God. Go out and face 2010 having this God as your God! A God who forgives and forgets and encourages you!
