"We must have all discovered long since that feelings come and go. and the devil, of course is well aware of that. So his special strategy at this point is to try to make us rely unduly upon our feelings and sensations and sensibilities. He persuades many people to base the whole of the Christians position upon them. They had some wonderful feelings on a certain occasion and they have based everything upon that experience. Or they may have had wonderful feelings in the presence of God in prayer, or at service, or elsewhere; and they have been relying upon the. Then, for some reason or another, their feelings seem distant to them. They are aware of a dryness; and a coldness; they do not feel any longer what they used to feel; and their whole position is shaken. The devil suggests to them that they are not Christians at all, that they have never been Christians.
