 - A. This is a major turning point in Luke's gospel.
 - 1. Jesus has completed his Galilean ministry. 4:14-9:50
 - 2. He begins His journey to Jerusalem. 9:51-19:44 13:22 17:11 Mark 10:32
 - B. In what sense is Jesus about to ascend? 9:31
 - 1. Lifted up to die on the cross? John 3:14-15 8:28 12:32-33
 - The ascension to glory which occurs after His crucifixion, death and resurrection? 24:51 Acts 1:2,9,11,22
 - 3. This appears to be another connection with the prophet Elijah. 9:30 2 Ki. 2:10-11
 - C. What is the significance of the fact that Jesus is determined to go to Jerusalem?
 - He knows what awaits Him there according to the divine purpose. 9:22 <u>13:33</u> 24:25-27 12:50 Isa. 53:10 Acts 2:23
 - 2. He is absolutely resolute to complete the work the Father has given Him to do. v. 62 John 6:38 4:34 <u>Isa. 50:7</u> Jer. 21:10 Ezek. 6:2 13:17 21:2-3 Heb. 12:2
 - D. How does this apply to us? Eph. 2:10 Acts 1:8 Mt. 28:18ff Titus 2:14 Ps. 90:10,12,17
 Heb. 9:27 12:1ff 1 Pet. 2:21 Rom. 8:18
- III. Others do not understand or appreciate Jesus' mission. v. 52-56
 - A. The Samaritans refuse to welcome Jesus. v. 52-53
 - 1. The Samaritans are products of intermarriage between Israelites from the Northern tribes and pagans who resettled in the land. 2 Kings 17:6-<u>24</u>
 - 2. Their religion was also a mixture of Judaism and paganism. 2 Ki. 17:25-41 John 4:20 Ezra 4:1ff Neh. 13:3,30
 - 3. Jesus sends some of His followers ahead to make arrangements for His entourage.
 - 4. Are there echos of John the Baptist here? 3:4,9,17 7:27 1:17,76 Mal. 3:1 John 4:25
 - 5. The Samaritans sinfully turn away the Lord's Servant. John 4:9
 - 6. The rejection by the Samaritans resembles the hostility Jesus experienced at the beginning of His Galilean ministry. 4:16-30
 - B. James and John want to bring God's wrath upon this village. v. 54 Mark 3:17
 - 1. They are right that the Samaritans are wrong about matters of religion and worship.
 - 2. It is true that these Samaritans were especially guilty for their failure to show hospitality to Jesus the Messiah. Gen. 18:1ff 19:1ff Heb. 13:1-2 Mt. 25:34ff
 - 3. Suddenly the disciples seem to have great faith that fire would come from heaven.
 - 4. There is precedent for their proposed action (again in the life of Elijah). 17:29 9:5 10:10-16 2 Ki. 1:9-12 Gen. 19:1ff John 1:14 13:20
 - C. Jesus rebukes them because they don't understand His present mission. 19:10 9:42
 - 1. He did not come to bring judgment, but rather to bring salvation. John 3:16-17 12:47
 - 2. Many among the Samaritans will be saved. John 4:39-42 Acts 1:8 8:1ff 15:3
 - 3. Elsewhere Samaritans are portrayed positively. 10:33ff 17:16
 - 4. When Jesus returns He will bring fiery wrath upon those who reject Him. 17:29-30 Rev. 20:9 2 Thess. 1:6ff

- D. Application:
 - 1. Are you prone to judge others? Mt. 7:1-5 Js. 4:11-12,1-3
 - God is patient and calls you to proclaim His mercy. 6:27-29 Ex. 34:6 Ps. 103:8
 2 Pet. 3:9 Rom. 2:4 Mt. 5:7 Rom. 12:19 Gen. 50:19 Col. 3:12-14 <u>2 Cor. 10:4-5</u>
 - 3. Are you hospitable? Heb. 13:1-3

IV. Those who follow Jesus must put Him first. v. 57-62

- A. As Jesus is walking down His hard road of obedience He encounters three prospective disciples. v. 57,59,61 5:11,27
- B. Jesus is more important than earthly comfort or security. v. 57-58 14:33 19:22 Mt. 8:18f
 - 1. Is there something wrong with this man's offer to follow Jesus? 22:33 John 13:36-37
 - 2. Jesus knows what is in this man's heart. 8:13-14 John 2:24
 - 3. Jesus and his followers give up their stake in this world. 18:28-31 Heb. 11:13-16 1 Pe. 2:11 John 1:11 6:66 2 Co. 8:9 Ps. 90:1 Phil. 2:19-21
- C. Jesus must take priority over every other relationship. v. 59-60 14:25-27 Mt. 12:49
 - 1. Burying a dead relative is an important family duty. Gen. 25:9 35:29 49:28-50:3 Josh. 24:29-30 Ex. 20:12 Lev. 21:1ff
 - 2. Elsewhere Jesus affirms our responsibility to care for our parents. Mt. 15:3ff
 - 3. Proclaiming Jesus' kingdom is even more important. 14:25-27 Mt. 5:23-24
 - 4. Was this man's father even dead yet?
 - 5. In what sense will the dead bury their own dead?
 - 6. We must put what Jesus wants us to do ahead of what our family wants us to do.
- D. You must follow Jesus without delay. v. 61-62 5:28
 - 1. When Elisha was called he was allowed to bid his family farewell. 1 Ki. 19.19-21 Acts 18:18,21 2 Co. 2:13
 - 2. The need to follow Jesus is more urgent.
 - 3. Don't look back. 17:32 Gen. 19:26

 - B. Jesus is not asking you to do for Him any more than He has already done for you. v. 51
