Webster's simply defines it as "marked by hypocritical censorious self-righteousness." Ouch! Their very title has become synonymous with hypocrisy! But let's face it: while we may not walk around in pretentious outfits emblazoned with overexaggerated religious symbols, most of us have to admit that we have a little Pharisee inside us. Our Lord points out that hypocrisy is a direct contradiction to genuine Christian living. But the struggle is real and we may actually discover we have numerous little pharisees lurking in us. They can be sneaky buggers: we need to identify them, confront them, and by the grace of God and with serious resolve ... and, this may sound harsh ... but put them to death.
