



 That you don't care about justice. • That everyone must ignore the need for change in the person who has done wrong. • That there are no penalties for what has been done wrong. • That there should be no safeguards put into place. • That the wrong must be ignored if it happens again. • That the wrong can never be talked about with the offender again.

• That the person who has been wronged can never tell anyone.

• That trust has been fully restored.



Most of the principles are the same: you still want to release vengeance to God, express forgiveness to them, and commit yourself to continuing forward in love. The difference is that you don't confront their sin in the same way that you would with a Christian, because you understand that their greatest need is for the gospel itself, not for help with that particular sin.

Does forgiveness cause revictimization?

It shouldn't cause revictimization if handled wisely and patiently. Even secular research is recognizing the power of forgiveness for victims (see Holcomb and Holcomb page 138). Withholding from them the opportunity to forgive could be very damaging.

However, revictimization could definitely occur if forgiveness is handled in a rushed or sloppy way. It is very important to keep in mind all of the statements earlier in this booklet about what forgiveness does *not* mean. Revictimization is likely to occur if we misunderstand or ignore any of those key principles.

In situations that involve an authority taking advantage of someone under their authority (such as teacher/student, parent/child, youth worker/teen), great caution must be used throughout the process of seeking to help the victim grant forgiveness.

What does it mean to forgive myself?

The Bible doesn't ever speak about forgiving ourselves or present that as a solution for our problems. This doesn't mean that we should dismiss the idea entirely, but that we should look further to see what heart struggles are prompting this concern. The booklets by Robert D. Jones titled *Bad Memories: Getting Past Your Past* and *Forgiveness: I Just Can't Forgive Myself* are recommended.

What if the wrong was done to me or by me long ago?

The general principles about forgiveness don't change, though wisdom or practical circumstances may lead you to handle the situation differently than you would if it occurred today. If a serious wrong was done many years ago, don't underestimate the potential power of seeking or offering forgiveness even today.

Conclusion

What Forgiveness Is

Forgiveness is love.

Forgiveness usually involves some type of release.

Releasing someone from repaying a debt to you.

Releasing judgment to the proper authorities.

Forgiveness is a commitment to bear the wrong ourselves.

"When there is a debt, someone must pay. Either the one who owes must pay it back, or the one who is owed must absorb the loss." "The person who forgives no longer expects to be repaid for what he has suffered and lost." (Timothy Lane)

"No one who is seriously wronged can 'just forgive' the perpetrator [he means, at no cost]. If you have been robbed of money, opportunity, or happiness, you can either make the wrongdoer pay it back or you can forgive. But when you forgive, that means *you* absorb the loss and the debt. You bear it yourself. All forgiveness, then, is costly." (Timothy Keller)

Forgiveness is mercifully unfair.

"Forgiveness always looks wrong in the eye, names it for what it is, feels the sting. Then you consciously act 'unfairly' in return. Anger is always about fairness ... but forgiveness is mercifully unfair.... If you forgive me, you do me an uncanny kindness."

"Forgiveness is a courageous clear-minded choice to be mercifully unfair." (David Powlison)

• Be encouraged that remembering a hurt does not necessarily mean that you have not forgiven. Don't despair.

- Face your thoughts seriously by writing them down.
- Consider that you might be doing things to keep the memory fresh.
- Be sure you are seeing your own sin, and not just focusing on the sin of others.

What do I do if I want to offer forgiveness to someone, but they don't agree with me about the wrong?

What if the wrongdoer continues to sin against me, though they often ask for forgiveness?

What if the wrongdoer states that they intend to continue doing the wrong?

- Release vengeance to God.
- Maintain an attitude of love and forgiveness in case they repent.
- Get help.

What do I do when I lose hope that someone will ever change?

What Forgiveness Looks Like

The Damaging Alternatives	Come back later and ask again.
Direct vengeance by causing harm	 How do I respond when someone asks me for forgiveness? Listen: don't assume you understand what they mean.
Indirect vengeance by withholding love	 Don't force them to rehearse every painful detail if you know they understand already. Don't minimize the sin or its painful consequences for you.
Indirect vengeance by withholding communication	 Don't maximize the sin and its painful consequences for you. Humbly point to the gospel if possible. If appropriate, encourage them with God's sovereignty.
Manipulation by withholding forgiveness	Offer to help, serve, and love.
Blackmailing	What do I do if I tell someone I forgive them, then later realize I really didn't?
Grumbling	What do I do when someone else insists that I haven't really forgiven them?
Gossip / Public Humiliation	
	What do I do when I can't stop thinking about a wrong done to me, though I have tried to forgive?

- 1) Name the wrong that you did, 2) say that it's wrong and you don't want to do it again, 3) try to express that you understand that you hurt them, and 4) ask them, "Will you forgive me?"
- Say more than "I'm sorry."
- Don't make excuses.
- Even if they did wrong too, that is not the time to mention it.

What can I do when it feels like someone else won't forgive me, or isn't truly acting as if they forgave me?

- Consider whether you asked for forgiveness in a genuine way.
- Humbly consider whether similar problems are continuing.
- Graciously recognize that their feelings are fighting against their will, and it's a struggle to live in forgiveness a day at a time.
- Humbly recognize that granting forgiveness does not immediately rebuild trust.

What do I do if someone refuses to forgive me?

- Don't demand it.
- Be patient.
- Be sympathetic and gracious.
- Carefully plan ways to bless them.
- Pray for them.

Bitterness / Resentment

How do I ask for forgiveness?

Colossians 3:12-13 Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you.

Luke 23:33-34 When they came to the place called the Skull, they crucified him there, along with the criminals—one on his right, the other on his left. Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." And they divided up his clothes by casting lots.

Romans 12:19-21 "Do not take revenge, my dear friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written: 'It is mine to avenge; I will repay,' says the Lord. On the contrary: 'If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head.' Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good."

Hard Questions about Forgiveness

Romans 4:7 Blessed are those whose transgressions are forgiven, whose sins are covered.

Ephesians 4:32 Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you.

Matthew 6:9-12 This, then, is how you should pray: "Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors."

Mark 11:25-26 And when you stand praying, if you hold anything against anyone, forgive them, so that your Father in heaven may forgive you your sins.

Matthew 18:21-35 ²¹ Then Peter came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, how many times shall I forgive my brother or sister who sins against me? Up to seven times?" ²² Jesus answered, "I tell you, not seven times, but seventy-seven times. ²³ "Therefore, the kingdom of heaven is like a king who wanted to settle accounts with his servants. ²⁴ As he began the settlement, a man who owed him ten thousand bags of gold was brought to him. ²⁵ Since he was not able to pay, the master ordered that he and his wife and his children and all that he had be sold to repay the debt. ²⁶ "At this the servant fell on his knees before him. 'Be patient with me,' he begged, 'and I will pay back everything.' ²⁷ The servant's master took pity on him, canceled the debt and let him go. ²⁸ "But when that servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred silver coins. He grabbed him and began to choke him. 'Pay

back what you owe me!' he demanded. ²⁹ "His fellow servant fell to his knees and begged him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay it back.' ³⁰ "But he refused. Instead, he went off and had the man thrown into prison until he could pay the debt. ³¹ When the other servants saw what had happened, they were outraged and went and told their master everything that had happened. ³² "Then the master called the servant in. 'You wicked servant,' he said, 'I canceled all that debt of yours because you begged me to. ³³ Shouldn't you have had mercy on your fellow servant just as I had on you?' ³⁴ In anger his master handed him over to the jailers to be tortured, until he should pay back all he owed. ³⁵ "This is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother or sister from your heart."
