II. The angelic announcement of the Savior's birth. v. 8-12

- A. Why is the announcement made to shepherds? v. 8
 - 1. God chooses to make the birth of His Son known, not to the great and mighty, but to the lowly. 1:51-53 14:11 Gen. 46:33-34 1 Co. 1:26ff Isa. 61:1ff
 - 2. Jesus both begins and ends his life among the underclass. 23:32-33
 - 3. David was a shepherd from Bethlehem who became a shepherd of God's people. 1 Sam. 16:11 17:28 2 Sam. 7:8
 - 4. The image of shepherd is elevated as God is portrayed as the Shepherd of His people. Psalm 23
 - 5. The promised Messiah would be the true Shepherd. Ps. 23 Ezek. 34:23f Isa. 40:11 Jer. 23:1ff Mic. 5:4
 - 6. Jesus is that Good Shepherd who lays down His life for His sheep. John 10:11 Mt. 9:36 25:32 26:31 1 Pet. 2:25 Heb. 13:20
 - 7. It appears that these shepherds had hearts which were prepared to hear the good news. 2:15,25-26,36-38
- B. The angel of the Lord suddenly appears to the shepherds. v. 9
 - 1. This is the third angelic announcement a sudden appearance, fear, "fear not", good news of a miraculous birth, and a confirming sign. 1:11-20,26-38

- C. The angelic message is good news (gospel) which brings great joy. v. 10-11a
 - 1. Fear is overcome by joy in the Messiah. 1:12,14,30 24:52 Mt. 2:10 28:8

 - 3. This joyful good news is for all people. 1:68,77 2:30-32 Gen. 12:3 John 3:16 Ro. 1:16-17 John 3:16 Eph. 2:11ff 1 Pet. 2:9ff
 - 4. He is born *for you* alludes to Old Testament Messianic promises. v. 11a <u>Isa. 9:6</u> <u>Zech. 9:9</u>
- D. What child is this? Or Who is this Child? His titles and honors:

III. Angelic praise to God. v. 13-14

- A. The one angel is suddenly joined by a great multitude. 2:13a Ps. 68:13 103:20 148:2 Mal. 3:1 Acts 2:2 9:3 1 Th. 5:3 Mark 13:36 Isa. 9:7
- B. God alone receives the glory in salvation. v. 13b-14a,20 19:37ff Eph. 2:1-10 1 Cor. 1:30-31 Rom. 8:29-30 Eph. 1:3ff Acts 2:47 3:8-9 Ps. 115:1 Eph. 3:21

- C. Jesus brings peace on earth for those upon whom God's favor rests. v. 14b
 - 1. This is good news because angels often come bringing judgment, not peace. 1 Ki. 22:19 Dan. 7:10-11 Mt. 24:29-31 2 Thess. 1:6-9 2 Chron. 18:18 Mal. 4:1 Nah. 2:13 3:5 Isa. 2:12 9:19 10:26 13:4,13 Jer. 25:29
 - 2. The peace Jesus brings is not an immediate political peace. 12:51-53 John 14:27 Mt. 24:6 Eph. 6:10ff
 - 3. Jesus has purchased peace with God for all who believe in Him. 1:79 <u>Isa. 9:6-7</u> Rom. 5:1-2,6-11 Col. 1:19-22 Acts 10:36
 - 4. We who are in Christ also enjoy subjective peace. John 14:27 Ga. 5:22 Isa. 26:3
 - 5. The peace He gives also results in peace with each other. Rom. 12:18 Heb. 12:14
 - 6. This peace is only for those upon whom God's (undeserved) favor (good pleasure) rests. 10:21 19:41-43 Ro. 3:17 Eph. 1:5,9 Phil. 2:13 Mt. 11:26 Isa. 26:12
 - 7. One day He will bring a dominion of peace to the whole world. Isa. 40-66 Ezek. 34:25ff Rev. 21:1ff
 - 8. There is an implicit contrast between the Pax Romana of Augustus Caesar and the true peace which Jesus brings. Jesus is the Prince of Peace. Isa. 9:6

IV. The shepherds go to see the Savior. v. 15-20

- A. They respond to the angelic revelation by quickly drawing near to Christ. v. 15-17
- B. Jesus, even in His infancy, causes intense responses. v. 18-20

- C. The shepherds set a pattern for all of us.

 - 4. You praise and glorify God. v. 20
 - 5. You tell others the good news. v. 17b-18 Mt. 28:18-20 5:14-16 Col. 4:6 2 Ki. 7:9 Isa. 52:7 Rom. 10:15
