Sermon: "A Nation of Bastards." Pt. 2- What's Wrong With You People? Pt. 35

I Text:

Old Covenant: *Judges 11:4-11*New Covenant: *Luke 23:13-25*

II Doctrine:

The Israelites once again lose National sovereignty for their collective sins. They are desperate for a deliverer and recruit the bastard gangster Jepthath, whom they had previously deported! The humiliation of the leadership in Israel is complete, and God appoints a deliver like themselves.

Jephtah like any gangster uses Israels need of a deliverer to his advantage. He procures the leadership of Israel for himself, predicated upon a victory of Israel's enemies. We know as believers God's sovereignty is allowing this to happen, not Jephthah's politics.

The effeminate leadership of Israel agrees to Jephthah's request to be Judge. An agreement is made before the Lord and Jephtah will prepare to deliver the nation.

III Comparing Scripture With Scripture:

- 1) The Israelites once again lose National sovereignty for their collective sins. They are desperate for a deliverer and recruit the bastard gangster Jepthath, whom they had previously deported! The humiliation of the leadership in Israel is complete, and God appoints a deliver like themselves. (*Judges* 11:4-7)
- 2) Jephtah like any gangster uses Israels need of a deliverer to his advantage. He procures the leadership of Israel for himself, predicated upon a victory of Israel's enemies. We know as believers God's sovereignty is allowing this to happen, not Jephthah's politics. (*Judges 10:8,9*)
- 3) The effeminate leadership of Israel agrees to Jephthah's request to be Judge. An agreement is made before the Lord and Jephtah will prepare to deliver the nation. (*Judges 10:10,11; Luke 23:13-25*)

usually offensive: a child born to parents who are not married to each other

NOTE: This sense of bastard has not always been offensive. In fact, it was a relatively neutral term until as recently as the late 20th century, when it began to take on its offensive status. This shift coincided with a positive change in societal attitudes towards unmarried parents and a lessening of the social stigma of having children outside of marriage. The word bastard is still used relatively neutrally in historical references and historical fiction, but is usually considered offensive when used in present-day contexts to describe a child born to parents not married to each other.
