Romans 14; Lord's Day 13 I BELIEVE IN JESUS AS LORD

- I. The confession.
 - A. As Lord He has the right to set the standard for what is right, to demand compliance, and to reward and punish.
 - B. Jesus Christ is supreme Lord of the entire universe.
 - C. Also Jesus is Lord in a special way to His people because He bought them with His blood and He rules over us by His grace.
- II. How does this confession reveal itself?
 - A. After redeeming us, He establishes His throne in our hearts, realizing His Lordship in us. We do not make Him our Lord.
 - 1. Christ's Lordship is made real to us by the work of His Spirit in our hearts, giving us a new, spiritual life (I Cor. 8:6; 12:3).
 - 2. To confess that Jesus is Lord is to say that He has rights to me.
 - 3. He is in sovereign and wise control of every circumstance and event in my life: work, economy, cancer, special needs, etc.
 - B. Then He sovereignly moves me surrender myself to Him.
 - 1. I see myself as His property: body and soul, heart, mind, will, family, possessions, job, etc.
 - 2. And this means that He rules over me by grace and the constraining power of His love, not by force and compulsion.
 - 3. Thus we begin to love Him as Lord-Redeemer, to long for Him, to trust Him, and to surrender ourselves to Him.
- III. The great implications of our confessing Jesus' Lordship.
 - A. First, all who call on the name of the Lord shall be saved (Rom. 10:13).
 - B. Second, His Lordship brings a great obligation.
 - C. Third, His Lordship gives great comfort.
 - D. To confess His Lordship in this world means we receive the hatred of the world (John 16:33).
