## INTRODUCTION:

1. THE DANGER OF ARROGANT LIBERTY (8:8-12).

a. Paul warned the "puffed-up" that their rights might cause their brothers and sisters to fall into sin (8:9).

(1) Stumblingblock "A scandal, or offense, is literally a stumbling block. It is caused when something is said or done in a way that leads someone to sin or hinders their spiritual life. The deed or word is not [necessarily] sinful in and of itself, but it makes someone to stumble in their spiritual life because of its circumstances; namely, it was done at such a time, in such a place, or by such a person. It is a scandal irrespective of whether anyone is actually caused to stumble or whether the person actually intended to offend."1
