Intentional Prayer

The word "intentional" has become a sort of evangelical buzzword-adjective for just about any spiritual pursuit these days. Paul's prayer for the Colossians provides us with good material for the elders and deacons as they pray intentionally for the flock at Covenant – and good material for you to keep your intentions in life in line with what God intends for you!
