WLC Q. 168. What is the Lord's Supper? A. The Lord's Supper is a Sacrament of the New Testament, wherein, by giving and receiving bread and wine according to the appointment of Jesus Christ, his death is shewed forth; and they that worthily communicate feed upon his body and blood, to their spiritual nourishment and growth in grace; have their union and communion with him confirmed; testify and renew their thankfulness, and engagement to God, and their mutual love and fellowship each with other, as members of the same mystical body. **WLC Q. 169.** How hath Christ appointed bread and wine to be given and received in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper? A. Christ hath appointed the ministers of his Word, in the administration of this Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, to set apart the bread and wine from common use, by the word of institution, thanksgiving, and prayer; to take and break the bread, and to give both the bread and the wine to the communicants: who are, by the same appointment, to take and eat the bread, and to drink the wine, in thankful remembrance that the body of Christ was broken and given, and his blood shed, for them.

WLC Q. 95. Of what use is the moral law to all men? A. The moral law is of use to all men, to inform them of the holy nature and will of God, and of their duty, binding them to walk accordingly; to convince them of their disability to keep it, and of the sinful pollution of their nature, hearts, and lives; to humble them in the sense of their sin and misery, and thereby help them to a clearer sight of the need they have of Christ, and of the perfection of his obedience. **WLC Q. 123.** Which is the fifth commandment? A. The fifth commandment is, Honor thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee. **WLC Q. 131.** What are the duties of equals? A. The duties of equals are, to regard the 1) dignity and 2) worth of each other, 3) in giving honor to go one before another; and 4) to rejoice in each other's gifts and 5) advancement, as their own. **WLC Q. 132.** What are the sins of equals? A. The sins of equals are, besides 1) the neglect of the duties required, 2) the undervaluing of the worth, 3) envying the gifts, 4) grieving at the advancement or prosperity one of another; and 5) usurping pre-eminence one over another.
