Free to Serve

Galatians 5.7-15 ~ November 6, 2011

> v7 ~ "You ran well... Who hindered you...?"

- Paul again refers to the racing analogy ~ doubt he was an athlete
 - But he chooses these metaphors to connect to his readers ~ cultural
- Paul reminds his readers they "were" on track
 - He "implies" that they're off track now...
 - And he asks them, "Who did this to you?"
 - The NIV even phrases it, "Who cut in on you?"
 - Runners could cheat like this ~ cut others off ~ trip them up
 - He asks who here and in v10 repeats who, whoever
- "Can anyone hinder you from obeying the truth?"
 - To hinder is not to prevent . . .

> v8 ~ "This persuasion does not come from Him who calls you"

- This 'persuasion' is a "willingness to disobey"
- Paul says clearly that such a desire is never from God
- Sometimes it is necessary to state the obvious
- "Why are you doing this? ~ God doesn't want you to?"

> v9 ~ "A little leaven leavens the whole lump" ~ "quoted" in non-NKJV

- The desire to circumcise is the 'tip of the iceberg'
- The desire to be saved by outward conformity will grow
- The function of leaven cannot be contained ~ it will continue
- Acceptance of self-justification is like the first tiny weed in your garden

> v10a ~ "I have confidence in you, in the Lord . . . " ~ another thought

- Paul knows these Galatians
- He speaks from having a first-hand relationship with them
- This is not a 'wishful' confidence ~ a smiley-face confidence
- He believes they have heard and will heed his words

Xition: His authority and confidence allow him to pronounce judgment . . .

- v10b ~ "he who troubles you shall bear his judgment . . . "
 - Paul again speaks with <u>authority</u> ~ the enemy is wrong and will be judged
 - Not just anyone had Paul's personal commission ~ but Moses did . . .
 - Korah's Rebellion in **Num 16.3** ~ "you take too much upon yourselves"
 - Moses responds, v5 ~ "tomorrow morning the Lord will show who is His"

> v11a ~ "if I still preach circumcision, why do I still suffer persecution?"

- He was likely accused of being fickle or inconsistent
 - Paul had <u>Timothy</u> circumcised (Acts 16.3) but <u>not Titus</u> (Gal 2.3)
- But he asks, "If I believed circumcision, why am I being persecuted?"

> v11b ~ "Then the offense of the cross has ceased"

- What is the 'offense of the cross?'
 - We must answer this before we go on . . .
 - Not the physical cross ~ (offense != curse)
 - Though Gal 3.13 says "cursed is everyone who hangs on a tree"
 - Jesus was the 'rock of offense' ~ Read Romans 9.30-33
 - Read 1 Cor 1.18-25
 - The offense is the "foolishness of the cross"
 - The <u>offense</u> is the fact that man's <u>works</u> and <u>wisdom</u> are <u>worthless</u>
- This is not just about circumcision . . . It's about works righteousness
- "ceased" ~ Any addition to the cross renders the cross of no offense

v12 ~ "cut themselves off"

- Paul's use of humor here is shocking ~ though not vulgar
- Some people believe **we must be serious** when we reference the Bible
 - Ill: Criticism of seminary students for "X" and cutting up Holy Bible
 - □ <u>///</u>: This Bible is only a book (drop Bible) ~ but what if I'm ordered to?
 - <u>III</u>: Story of Korean girl making that choice
 - □ <u>III</u>: Picture of Jesus overlooking child's crib or bed
- Let's recognize and accept that the Bible contains rough humor
 - Isaiah mocks idolatry in Is 40 ~ "will not totter"
 - Elijah <u>taunts</u> prophets of Baal on Mt. Carmel
 - Let's take seriously our service of the Lord . . . but not ourselves . . .
 - And let's accept God's use of humor ~ and not condemn people for it

Xition: After indulging in some <u>humor</u> Paul hits the main point . . .

- > v13a ~ "you . . have been called to liberty"
 - We spoke of this at length last week
 - All of what we spoke of last week is in Paul's mind
 - He wants people to be passionate about their freedom

> v13b ~ "do not use liberty .. to indulge the flesh"

- We are free . . . We can sin . . . "yet we're free from condemnation"
- Read Rom 8.1-3
- <u>III</u>: Movie "Bolt" ~ cat has no claws ~ yet she pretends
 - The Church has authority as God's government on earth
 - "What did God give the Church?"
 - "Was it a sword?" ~ NO... God gave us keys . . .
 - ♦ We're doorkeepers . . . We invite people to enter . . .
 - We also show people the door and ask them to leave . . .
 - Yet we have only the authority God has given
 - Our actions do not <u>condemn or justify</u>
 - Our actions point at condemnation or justification

> v13c ~ "through love serve one another"

- "through love" ~ not "in love"
 - Paul describes love as <u>a means to</u> achieve a desired end
 - □ <u>III</u>: Corrie ten Boom and <u>Ravensbruck</u> prison guard
 - Read excerpt of <u>Hiding Place</u> pg 230 "I continued to speak . . ."
 - It was not "in love" that she extended her hand but "through love"

> v14a ~ "all the law is fulfilled in one word . . . "

- Just as the <u>law was broken</u> through one action one <u>selfish</u> action
- The <u>law was fulfilled</u> through one action one <u>selfless</u> action
- The Jewish teachers lost the essence of religion in complexity
- What was inherently simple love they built a complex system around
- We can do the same thing . . .
 - We can be uncomfortable with the simplicity of salvation
 - We can want it to be safeguarded in some way . . . no riff raff . . .

Xition: Love your neighbor as yourself

> v14b ~ "You shall love your neighbor as yourself"

- "How do we love ourselves?"
 - For starters, we nearly always seek our own comfort
 - <u>///</u>: Hudson Taylor slept in attic room open to sky & snow China too
 - We forgive ourselves quickly, thoughtlessly
 - Though angry with ourselves we'll:
 - change positions to get more comfortable
 - scratch our nose when it itches
 - ♦ eat when we're hungry . . . drink when we're thirsty
 - we escape discomforts to our flesh habitually and consistently
 - ◆ <u>III</u>: Walking in to work (cold) ~ man in short shirt sleeves

> v15 ~ "But if you bite . . beware . . lest you be consumed"

- Read v15
- "If we bite and devour one another"
 - <u>III</u>: This is a gross picture . . . <u>cannibalism</u> . . .
 - □ <u>III</u>: "Dawn of the Dead" (1978) ~ shot in Pittsburg shopping mall
 - Filmed for \$650k ~ grossed \$55M
 - Hell is full ~ the dead walk the earth and eat the living
- There is an evil nourishment at work in what Paul warns against
 - Ill: Peretti books portray this well ~ "This Present Darkness"
 - <u>III</u>: "Screwtape Letters" portrays it very well
 - When we participate in gossip, back-biting, character assassination
 - We're indulging an 'immoral hunger' within us. . .
 - Some hungers are <u>moral</u> ~ we're to <u>satisfy</u> them
 - Some hungers ate <u>immoral</u> ~ we're to <u>starve</u> them
- God teaches us the difference
- But we don't always obey ~ just as the Galatians to whom Paul is writing

But <u>God expects obedience</u> from His children ~ and that at <u>all</u> times Let's do as God says and "love our neighbors as ourselves"

We've seen how: <u>Completely</u>, <u>Thoughtlessly</u>, <u>Constantly</u>, without <u>Regret</u>
We are free from condemnation
Let's use our freedom to serve one another...

Let us pray . . .
