WCF, 5, 5: The most wise, righteous, and gracious God, doth oftentimes leave for a season his own children to manifold temptations and the corruption of their own hearts, 1) to chastise them for their former sins, or 2) to discover unto them the hidden strength of corruption and deceitfulness of their hearts, 3) that they may be humbled; and 4) to raise them to a more close and constant dependence for their support upon himself, and 5) to make them more watchful against all future occasions of sin, and 6) for sundry other just and holy ends.

- I. The questions
 - a. How long, O Lord?
 - b. Will You forget me forever?
 - c. How long will You hide Your face from me?
 - d. How long shall I take counsel in my soul, *having* sorrow in my heart daily?
 - e. How long will my enemy be exalted over me?
- II. The prayers
 - a. Consider *and* hear me, O Lord my God;
 - b. Enlighten my eyes, lest I sleep the *sleep of* death
- III. The praises
 - a. But I have trusted in Your mercy
 - b. My heart shall rejoice in Your salvation
 - c. I will sing to the Lord, because He has dealt bountifully with me

WLC Q. 104. What are the duties required in the first commandment? A. The duties required in the first commandment are, the knowing and acknowledging of God to be the only true God, and our God; and to worship and glorify him accordingly, by thinking, meditating, remembering, highly esteeming, honouring, adoring, choosing, loving, desiring, fearing of him; believing him; trusting hoping, delighting, rejoicing in him; being zealous for him; calling upon him, giving all praise and thanks, and yielding all obedience and submission to him with the whole man; being careful in all things to please him, and sorrowful when in any thing he is offended; and walking humbly with him.
