All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness. -2 Tim 3:16


Torno prophecy was ever produced by the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit. -2 Pet 1:21


