Three common sentiments that come with problems:

- 1) **Woe** is me Lord! Verse 1-5
 - a. Sometimes trouble is **public** and you suffer with everyone else.
 - b. Sometimes trouble is **private** and you seem to suffer alone.
- 2) Why me Lord? Verse 6-18
 - a. We show a preference for **solitude** (verse 8,11)
 - b. We show a presence of **bitterness**
 - i. Doubting God's **plan** (verse 13)
 - ii. Doubting God's **goodness** (verse 20-21)
 - iii. Rejecting God's comfort; "Go Away"
 - iv. Giving bad **counsel** (verse 15)
- 1) What now Lord? Verse 19-22, Chapter 2
 - a. See how God is providing **comfort**; "people"
 - b. See how God is providing **hope** (verse 6, 22)
 - c. See how God is providing **help** (chapter 2, verse 1)
 - d. See how God is providing a redeemer;
