Acts 6:1-7

Main Point:

Since faithful elders and deacons are vital for the church, give thanks and pray for those who serve in our congregation.

1. The church is to meet both the spiritual and physical needs of the people.

2. In order to meet the spiritual needs, Jesus has created the office of elder.

3. In order to meet the physical needs, Jesus has created the office of deacon.

4. When both offices function properly, the church is blessed and able to grow.
