Sermon 4 in the Philippians Series

Philippians 1:1-11

Today we deal with the first paragraph in the Book of Philippians.

I. Introductory Greetings v. 1

When you have a master like the Lord Jesus Christ – what could be better than to be totally sold out to Him and absolutely dependent in every way upon Him!

II. Grace and Peace v. 2

Here is the normal greeting almost always used by Paul.

The origin is from God our Father – and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Grace is a Greek greeting – while peace is more toward the Hebrew (like shalom).

III. Thanksgiving and Christian Love v. 3-8

- A. Paul's Love for Them. v. 3, 8
- B. Paul's Intercession for Them v. 4
- C. Paul's Fellowship with them in the Spread of the Gospel. 5-7

Fellowship = koinonia

They were not ashamed of his chains.

They were partakers with him in God's grace.

Co-laborers – fellow saints – willing to sacrifice for the sake of the gospel.

They were not content to let Paul do all the "heavy lifting".

To paraphrase the commentator Jean Daille

- 1) It is praise-worthy when Christians do not go into hiding when a fellow Christian is suffering for his faith.
- 2) It is even more praise-worthy when Christians seek to help a fellow Christian who is suffering for the gospel.
- 3) It is praise-worthy when Christians go out of their way, risk their own safety, and give of their time, treasure and talent to help a fellow Christian who is suffering for the gospel.

IV. Paul's Sincere Prayer v. 9-11

There are three main requests that Paul makes on their behalf in his intercessory prayers for them. They are divided up nicely in these three verses. (My own translation)

A. v. 9 -- And this I pray, that your love may be continually overflowing more and more in knowledge and all discernment.

His prayer was that their love would be like a mighty, roaring river.

Not a wild river rushing to destroy all in its path.

A powerful river contained by two banks – knowledge and discernment

B. v. 10 - (I pray) for you to approve (after careful testing), the most excellent things, in order that you may be pure and blameless in the Day of Christ

The most excellent things.

Their growing knowledge and discernment is put to use.

In the study of Christian Liberty – we talk about the *adiaphora* (things indifferent) Paul uses the opposite of *adiaphora* here – the excellent things.

C. v. 11 - (I pray) that you would be filled with the fruit of righteousness, through Jesus Christ unto the praise and glory of God.

The righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ Phil 3:9 The fruit of righteousness is the Fruit of the Spirit. Gal. 5:22-23.

V. Application: True Love requires Growth and Maturation

- v. 9 No specific object is given for love
 - Paul wants their overall love to grow.
 - The love he is speaking of is not a feeling.

Paul wants them to be characterized by love.

- A growing love for God
- -- This will naturally lead them to love one another
- They increase in love for the truth, as they know, understand and mature.

1 Corinthians 13:13 -- And now abide faith, hope, love, these three; but the greatest of these *is* love.
