## STEWARDSHIP: THE REGULATIVE PRINCIPLE OF LIFE

TEXT: Luke 16:1-9; 1 Cor. 4:2

**INTRODUCTION:** If our lives are to be lived wisely and worthily, they must be undergirded by wise and worthy **principles**. The highest and best principle of life is the principle of **stewardship**.

Who is a "steward"? A steward is not the owner, proprietor, CEO, or president. God is the owner of all that we have (Hag. 2:8; Deut. 8:18a). We are not owners, but stewards. A steward [Gk. "oikonomos"] is one who has been entrusted with the affairs of another (or others).

From beginning to end, the Bible magnifies the principle of stewardship. We are "not our own." We are "bought with a price." Therefore, everything we are and have and can be is a trusteeship, a sacred stewardship.
