- 3. What verses covered were most helpful? How so?
- 4. Which comparison/s (IA & IIA, etc.) were the most striking and why?
- 5. Why do some people look at the material world and still *not* see evidence of a Creator? What is the motivation for this?
- 6. Why do some people look at the material world and *see* evidence of a Creator?
- 7. What attributes of creation are significant for your faith in God and why?
- 8. What is God's purpose in the creation? What is the proper response to creation? What will this lead to?
- 9. What is the other response? What will this lead to?
- 10. What purpose of God is general revelation *not* designed for? What *is* given for this purpose?
- 11. The natural sciences emerged in the midst of Christendom. What considerations help to understand this? List some early scientists and their spiritual convictions.
- 12. What is the proper relationship between the study of general revelation and the study of special revelation?
- 13. What are some books, videos, lectures, conferences, etc. that you have found helpful for a right understanding of these things?
