Text: Titus 2:14

¹¹ For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, ¹² Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; ¹³ Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ; ¹⁴ Who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself <u>a peculiar people</u>, zealous of good works.

Introduction

1. What is it to be a Peculiar People?

- a. Webster's: "odd, unusual, strange." Many common synonyms. Oxford: "special" as a secondary meaning.
- b. The Greek is *periousios*. *Peri* = around or surround. *Ousious* = to be or being. Thus a surrounded or embraced possession. The phrase *laos periousious* is found in the LXX of Dt 7:6; Dt 14:2; Dt 26:18; Ex 19:5. Cf. 1 Pet 2:9 (where *peropoiēsis*, redeemed or "purchased possession"- Eph 1:14 is used).
