WLC Q 171: How are they that receive the sacrament of the Lord's supper to prepare themselves before they come unto it? A. They that receive the sacrament of the Lord's supper are, before they come, to prepare themselves thereunto, by examining themselves 1) of their being in Christ, 2) of their sins and wants; 3) of the truth and measure of their knowledge, 4) faith, 5) repentance; 6) love to God and 7) the brethren, 8) charity to all men, 9) forgiving those that have done them wrong; 10) of their desires after Christ, and 11) of their new obedience; and (applying to all 11 that are listed) by renewing the exercise of these graces, by serious meditation, and fervent prayer.

I. What is repentance?

- a. **WLC Q. 76: What is repentance unto life?** A. Repentance unto life is 1) a saving grace, 2) wrought in the heart of a sinner by the Spirit and Word of God, 3) whereby, out of the sight and sense, not only of the danger, but 4) also of the filthiness and odiousness of his sins, and 5) upon the apprehension of God's mercy in Christ to such as are penitent, 6) he so grieves for and 7) hates his sins, 8) as that he turns from them all to God, 9) purposing and endeavouring constantly to walk with him in all the ways of new obedience.

WLC Q. 86: What is the communion in glory with Christ, which the members of the invisible church enjoy immediately after death? A. The communion in glory with Christ, which the members of the invisible church enjoy immediately after death is, in that their souls are then made perfect in holiness, and received into the highest heavens, where they behold the face of God in light and glory, waiting for the full redemption of their bodies [Psalm 16], which even in death continue united to Christ, and rest in their graves as in their beds, till at the last day they be again united to their souls. Whereas the souls of the wicked are at their death cast into hell, where they remain in torments and utter darkness, and their bodies kept in their graves, as in their prisons, till the resurrection and judgment of the great day.
