Hebrews 13:15-16

The author of Hebrews quotes or cites the Psalter THIRTY times in just 13 chapters! As a Hebrew himself, the author continually appeals to the Psalter (sung by both himself and his readers) to support his Christocentric convictions. Against the backdrop of this litany of Psalter quotations we should understand the exhortation "through" Christ to offer up "a sacrifice of praise to God" as an exhortation to sing the Psalms! Commit yourself to contentedly and continually offering praise with YOUR mouth!
