NT: Revelation 3:14-22

Theme: God's servants are sinful and flawed. But not even our sin can thwart God's plans and purposes. He has called a people for his own possession and he answers their cries for deliverance.

Background: Samson judged Israel 20 years – then comes the story of his death.

Introduction: Recent *Time* magazine "special edition" was dedicated to the opioid epidemic in the US and what happens when you fall under its control. Samson's addictions begin to take control of his life.

I. Samson's Spiritual Blindness

NOTE: Judges 16:1-3 tie Samson's past – to what is about to unfold.

- A. His "addictions"
 - 1. Women a Philistine prostitute
 - 2. Danger?
 - Gaza Philistine territory
- B. His arrogance
 - 1. "His" strength
 - Presumption
 - Seen not as a gift but as an entitlement!
 - 2. Assuming success is assured
 - Regardless of his actions
 - Regardless of his Nazirite vow
- C. His actions
 - 1. Serving God's purposes
 - -"Seeking an occasion" against the Philistines
 - Picturing God's power to save
 - His moral and spiritual weakness, reflecting Israel's weakness

NOTE: God's power and plans superintend our plans and actions. God takes our weakness, failings, sin – and uses it to fulfill his ends and purposes. Consider Joseph and his brothers in Genesis 37-50.

- 2. Serving his own ends
 - Takes God's gifts (sexual love, his gift of strength) and abuses them

APPLICATION: In *grace* God uses our weaknesses and failures for his glory and our good. In *sin* we take God's blessing and provision and seek to turn them to our own ends.

II. The Path to Physical Bondage

- A. Delicious, delightful Delilah (4-9)
 - 1. Her motivation (5)
 - Greed!
 - 2. Her strategy
 - Subtlety is not her strong suit! (6)
 - 3. Samson in her power (10)
 - The game gets more desperate
 - 3rd time? Getting closer (13)
- B. Soporific Samson
 - 1. Misplaced "love"
 - 2. Losing his senses
 - She wins he sins
 - Shows his weakness

- C. Crossing the line
 - 1. He never learns! (Proverbs 26:11)
 - 2. Despising God's blessing and calling

Application: How many times must the Lord rescue us from the same situations?

- 3. The Lord's patience ends (20)
 - a. Shattered assumptions
 - Obedience doesn't matter? Shattered.
 - Strength was his to use as he pleased? Wrong.
 - b. Why now?
 - Can't know
 - Not one mark of the vow is left uncorrupted
 - c. The consequences of sin
 - Blindness, bondage, shame
 - They fall on us all

III. Restoring Spiritual Sight

- A. Philistine blindness
 - 1. Letting his hair grow?
 - Their god won. Game over! (24)
 - 2. Their "entertainment" (25)
 - 3. Between the pillars
 - To mock, humiliate
 - Poor choice of staging
- B. An Israelite's prayer The climax of the story!
 - 1. Samson's hope
 - a. Two prayers
 - First prayer to live (The 1st climax)
 - Last Prayer to die, with honor in the Lord's service
 - b. A "mustard Seed" of Faith
 - Finally exercises the faith that we had hoped to see
 - 2. Israel's hope as well
 - a. Samson as a reflection of Israel
 - Chosen, blessed, receiving God's favor, forsaking their first love, blind to their danger, assuming God will always bless

NOTE: This may well describe many "churches" today. 2 Timothy 3:5

- b. Samson as a Reminder to Israel
 - -They can still cry out to God

IV. The Lessons of Samson

- A. The vessels God uses
 - Jars of clay (2 Corinthians 4:7)
 - Vessels he can shape, strengthen, equip, fill (Romans 8:29; Ephesians 3:16; Hebrews 13:21; Romans 15:13)
- B. It is not the *form* of godliness we seek but the *power!*
- C. God is patient but sin will bear its fruit
- D. Anticipation Without Disappointment
 - Our anticipation regarding Samson is entertaining but disappointing!
 - Our anticipation regarding Christ the Lord will be outstripped by his fulfillment
