Genesis: The Book of Beginnings

So one day when all of them except Benjamin were alone with Joseph, they did a very bad thing. They sold Joseph to some traveling men, and those men took Joseph way far away to another country called Egypt and sold him as a slave in Egypt. Poor Jacob thought Joseph was dead and cried and cried.

But in Egypt, God was still with Joseph. God had the man who had bought Joseph like Joseph and be good to him. Joseph worked hard for the man who had him and soon Joseph was taking care of the whole house for the man. But one day the man's wife told some lies about Joseph, and Joseph was put in jail. But God was with Joseph in jail, and soon Joseph was taking care of the whole jail.

Joseph was not only a good man, he was also a prophet. A prophet is someone to whom God tells things that others don't know. One day the king of Egypt, called Pharaoh, had a bad dream. Usually our dreams don't mean anything, but this was a very special bad dream that meant something important. And Pharoah was very upset because he didn't know what the dream meant. Remember, though, that Joseph was a prophet, and God told Joseph what the dream meant, so Joseph was able to tell Pharaoh what his bad dream meant. Pharaoh liked this idea, and Pharaoh had Joseph be the man who would take care of saving the extra food. Pharaoh made Joseph to be very, very important in Egypt, almost as important as the king himself! So Joseph was taking care of all of Egypt! Wasn't God being good to Joseph! You see, God had a plan for Joseph.

Well, during the 7 years when lots of food grew, Joseph saved all of the extra food in special buildings. Then the 7 years came when no food grew. So people would come to Joseph and buy food from him. And guess what? Back where Joseph's father and brothers lived, the food wasn't growing either. They didn't have any food left. So Joseph's father, Jacob, told Joseph's brothers to go to Egypt and buy food.

Joseph's brother all went down to Egypt except the youngest brother Benjamin. Jacob didn't want Benjamin to go, because Benjamin was the only one of Rachel's sons that he had left. So the 10 brothers went into Egypt to Joseph without Benjamin. When Joseph saw them, Joseph knew who they were, but they didn't know who he was! He didn't tell them that he was Joseph, their brother that they had sold as a slave! Joseph sold the food to his brothers, but he told them they couldn't

come back for more food unless they brought Benjamin with them.

So the brothers went back to Jacob their father. After a while their food was all gone and Jacob wanted them to go to Egypt to buy more food. But the brothers told their father Jacob that the important man in Egypt (who they didn't know was their brother Joseph!) told them they couldn't buy any more food unless they brought Benjamin with them. Poor Jacob didn't know what to do. But finally since they were all out of food, Jacob had to let them take Benjamin with them. One of the older brothers named Judah said that he would take care of Benjamin.

Well, the 11 brothers got to Egypt again and came to Joseph to buy food. Joseph was so glad to see Benjamin. Joseph still didn't tell his brothers who he was, but he had them go to his house to have dinner with him. After they had eaten, Joseph sold them the food they wanted and sent them home. But Joseph had their money put back in their sacks of food and had his own silver cup put in Benjamin's sack. Now, why do you suppose Joseph did that? Well, he had a plan to find out if his brothers were really sorry for having been so bad to him!

After the brothers started to go back home, Joseph sent a man out to chase after them and ask them why they had stolen Joseph's cup. The brothers knew they hadn't stolen anything, and they said that if the man could find the cup, then the one who had the cup would be Joseph's slave. So the man looked in all the sacks, and last of all he looked in Benjamin's sack. And, of course, there was Joseph's cup, right where he had put it!! Well, the brothers were all very upset. And they all just loaded up their donkeys and ran back to Joseph. They all fell on the ground in front of Joseph, and Judah told Joseph, "Take us all as slaves!" Joseph said, "No, I'll only take as a slave the one who had my cup." But Judah said, "Oh, sir, please listen. Benjamin, this brother of ours is our father's favorite son now since our other brother is dead." (He was talking about Joseph as being dead!) "I told my father that I would take care of Benjamin, and I can't go home without him. Please, sir, please keep me as a slave and let Benjamin go home to our father. Our father will die if anything happens to Benjamin!" You can see that Judah and the others were all very sorry that they had been so mean to Joseph years before when they had sold him as a slave. They knew there was no way they could give Joseph back to their father, Jacob, but they didn't want anything to happen to Benjamin now.

Well, Joseph knew from what Judah said that his brothers were really and truly sorry for what they had done to him, and he forgave them. Joseph began to cry, and he said to them, "I am Joseph, your brother!!" The brothers didn't know what to think! Here was this very important man in Egypt saying that he was their brother! So Joseph said, "Yes, I am your brother Joseph. The one you sold as a slave to Egypt. You thought you were being mean to me, but God had that as a plan so that you would be saved alive when there wasn't any food!"

Then Joseph told his brothers that there were more years of famine, and they should go back and get their father Jacob and their families and bring them all down into Egypt, and there Joseph would take care of all of them. And Joseph grabbed Benjamin and hugged him and kissed him, and Benjamin and Joseph hugged each other and cried. Then Joseph cried more as he kissed his other 10 brothers, the ones who had sold him to be a slave. Joseph had truly forgiven them and only

wanted to help them.

Well, Pharoah heard about this, and Pharaoh liked Joseph very much and wanted to make Joseph happy, so Pharaoh told Joseph to send wagons down to get his father and his brothers' wives and children and to bring them into Egypt where he could take care of them. So that's what Joseph did.

Joseph's brothers took the wagons and went back home to Jacob, their father. And they told him how Joseph was alive and was very important in Egypt. Jacob could hardly believe it! Why, Joseph wasn't dead after all! Jacob was so very happy! Then the brothers took their wives and children and Jacob their father into the wagons and took them all back to Egypt. And Joseph took care of them all during the years that there was no food. They all lived a in good part of Egypt where there was lots of grass for their sheep and cows. And they all lived there in Egypt and were happy there in Egypt.

Jacob was a prophet, too, and when Jacob was very old, he told his son Judah that one of Judah's descendants would be a great king. We know that this great king would be our Saviour, Jesus, who would come and die for us and be made alive again.

So that is the end of the book of Genesis, the book of beginnings. The beginning of the world, the beginning of the sun and moon and stars, the beginning of plants and animals and people, the beginning of the clean world after the Flood, the beginning of God's special people, the Jews, and the beginning of God's promises of a Saviour for us. Weren't there some interesting stories in Genesis? And the best part is that they were all true, they really happened. And, yes, Genesis is really the book of beginnings, isn't it? The beginning of the world and people, the beginning of the Jewish nation, and the beginning of God's promises to people that He would send a Saviour to save people from the punishment of theirs sins. This Saviour's name is Jesus, but we find that out later in the Bible.

Now, there are a few names that you should remember from the book of Genesis. Of course, we always remember God. God is all through the whole Bible. But from Genesis, we need to remember Adam and Eve, Noah, then Abraham, his son Isaac, Abraham's grandson Jacob, and Jacob's 12 sons who are Joseph and his brothers. So, Adam and Eve, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, and Joseph and his brothers. If you remember those names, you'll be able to remember about the first book in the Bible, the book of Genesis, the beginning of everything.
