Schedule for Worship During the Coronavirus Pandemic: Events have been changing rapidly and the Session and Diaconate are working diligently to adapt to circumstances that have been set upon us. For the present, the Session will be live-streaming a modified worship service via SermonAudio.com that you can access. The service intends to start at 10:45 a.m. Sunday morning, our customary time to meet for worship. There undoubtedly will be blips and glitches, so we ask for your patience and indulgence as we feel our way through in this.

For the present, our governing authorities have requested a limit of no more than 10 people for a public gathering, so we will have a skeleton crew for transmitting the service electronically and to assist in worship that complies with that request.

Once the pandemic begins to subside, the intention is to gradually ease back into our normal schedule of worship. We then intend to hold multiple services on the Lord's Day for those who feel comfortable to attend and to provide for a safe distance between them by limiting the number present. We pray that this hazard will abate to the extent that we might be able to resume a modified schedule of worship on Easter Sunday, April 12.

The Session encourages all to be gracious and accommodating to the consciences of our brethren who may be uncomfortable to gather publicly during this pandemic and even once the threat of the virus subsides. With a situation as fluid as this has been, we all must support, encourage, care for, and forebear with one another as we navigate through this life-altering experience.

More details will be forthcoming as events and circumstances dictate.

2. **What way of thinking are we to adopt (v. 1a)?**
3. **What does suffering for Christ in the life of the believer mean (v. 1b)?**
4. **What is the purpose for being ready to suffer for the Lord Jesus (v. 2)?**
5. **What characterized the Gentile life (v. 3)?**
6. **How did non-believers often react to Peter's audience when they refused to participate with them (v. 4)?**
7. **What does Peter want his audience to know regarding how unbelievers treat them for refusing to participate with them (v. 5)?**
8. **To whom will persecutors of Christians give an account (v. 5)?**
9. **What ensures that believers have victory over their persecutors (v. 6a)?**
10. **What happens to those who have believed and accepted the Gospel even though they may suffer and be persecuted in this life (v. 6b)?**
11. **Does suffering mean that the Christian no longer sins (v. 1b)?**
12. **What might the resolve to endure suffering in your life look like?**
13. **Does suffering for the Gospel mean that a Christian is on a higher plane spiritually than those who do not so suffer?**
14. **What does suffering do for the believer with respect to his or her practice of sin? Why might this be the case?**
15. **Should Christians court suffering in order to be more sanctified? What ancient and medieval lifestyle might this encourage?**
16. **Does a non-believer always live a profligate life? How do you decide between what is acceptable behavior on the part of non-believers and what is unacceptable?**
17. **Have you ever been maligned or slandered for refusing to participate in certain behavior whether at work, school, or with friends? Why did you refuse to participate?**
18. **In which common practices of an unbelieving world today should Christians refuse to participate? Where do the descriptions that Peter makes of Gentile behavior in verse 3 show up today?**
19. **Where do you witness a significant amount of persecution of God's people today? How likely do you think it is that Christians will suffer for the Gospel in our country? Why or why not?**
20. **How can you prepare yourself for suffering when it might seem so remote a possibility in your life?**
