- 1.2.2. An allowed trying of God in some cases
- 1.2.3. A sinful tempting of God
 - 1.2.3.1. Generally

III. Use: Let us not tempt God

- 1. Not by requiring new grounds of faith when God hath given sufficient already
- 2. Do not run into any kind of willful and known sin to try God's patience
- 3. When sorely distressed, wait upon God
 - 3.1. Let your heart be deeply possessed with apprehensions of the goodness of God
 - 3.2. Be firmly persuaded of God's care and providence
 - 3.3. Let all of this produce in you a holy obstinacy of trust and obedience
