Sermon Series: The Night Jesus Was Betrayed: Luke 22:1-65

**Sermon Text:** Luke 22:47-65 The Master of His Arrest

As the Master, Christ rules to serve the salvation of His servants.

- 1) Christ is Master of His arrest (22:47-53).
  - a) Exposes Judas' treachery
  - b) Checks the violence of His disciples
  - c) Indicts His enemies for injustice
  - d) Interprets the time of His trial as Satanic
- 2) Christ is Master of Peter's repentance (22:54-62).
  - a) Christ's Turning Look
    - i) "turned" is usually followed by a verbal rebuke or instruction (7:9, 44; 9:55; 10:23; 14:25; 23:28)
    - ii) "looked at" is to stare or gaze intently—a penetrating look
  - b) Peter's "Turning"—remembered, went out, wept bitterly
- 3) Christ is Master of His suffering (22:63-65).
  - a) Christ's suffering—mocking, beating, brutal game
  - b) Blasphemy—can be used of slander or religious abuse of God's name; because Jesus is called Lord throughout Luke with the sense of Yahweh, Luke most likely intends blasphemy in its religious sense here.
  - c) As the Sovereign LORD, His suffering in His human nature is all according to His Divine purpose.

## As the Master, Christ rules to serve the salvation of His servants.

- Christ saves us from the idolatrous greed of Judas.
- Christ saves us from the fearful duplicity of Peter.
- Christ saves us from the blasphemous hostility of the guards.
