VERY PERSONAL

VERY OPEN and HONEST - Self-disclosure is important in prayer...

^{2nd} – Ask God to Rise Up For You (v.6-9)

Because of our sin nature, we fall into two extremes:

1st – HARD-HEARTED indifference

2nd – HOT-HEADED activism

N.T. Wright – 'The word judgment carries negative overtones for a good many people in our liberal and post-liberal world. We need to remind ourselves that throughout the Bible, not least in the Psalms, God's coming judgment is a good thing, something to be celebrated, longed for, yearned over. It causes people to shout for joy and the trees of the field to clap their hands. In a world of systematic injustice, bullying, violence, arrogance, and oppression, the thought that there might be a day when the wicked are firmly put in their right place and the poor and weak are given their due is the best news there can be. Faced with a world of rebellion, a world full of exploitation and wickedness, a good God must be a God of judgment.' - Surprised by Hope: Rethinking Heaven, the Resurrection, and the Mission of the Church (p.137)
