


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Words mean what they mean. **NOT** what we might think they mean.

Overview of Expository Preaching Webster's 1828 Dictionary Exposition: A laying open; a setting to public view. A situation in which a thing is exposed or laid open

 Explanation; interpretation;

 a laying open the sense or meaning of an author or of any passage in a writing.

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Overview of Expository Preaching The goal of all preaching should be... To explain the meaning of Scripture! ~ To lay it open ~

- ~ To expound the text~
- ~ To give the sense ~

Preaching: noun – to herald, to proclaim. To declare. To admonish. To warn. To bear witness.

And to do so with fervency and urgency. With passion and compassion.

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Overview of Expository Preaching

The Bible Expositor stands between Two Worlds

> The Ancient and the Modern... and never lets go of either.

With one hand you cling to the **historical**, **cultural**, **geographical** and **theological** issues within the Text, and with the other hand you reach out to the modern hearer and accurately apply the timeless truth learned from the passage.

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Overview of Expository Preaching

- We must be familiar with the context into which the author is writing.

- We must understand what prompted this book/epistle/narrative.

- We must seek to find the timeless principle from the passage that speaks to our hearers.

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This is what expository preaching does.

Rather than beginning with an idea, topic or destination already in mind. Then trying to find a Text that **may** use the word/phrase that sort of sounds like what we want to talk about.

Instead - The expositor seeks to remain true to authorial intent.

- To accurately relate the message that GOD intended to be learned from this particular portion of Scripture.

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
Overview of Expository Preaching

This requires time and effort. And IS NOT the easy way to preach.

However, it is the **MOST BIBLICAL** way to preach.

Expository Preaching is NOT just one style among many, but is rather a desire to stay true to the Holy Spirit's purpose in having this Text recorded for humanity.





God promised that His Word would not return unto Him void... Isaiah 55:11

- NOT our clever outlines.

- NOT 3 points and a poem.
- NOT our political views.
- Not our life experiences.

- NOT our ingenious alliteration.

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Overview of Expository Preaching There is nothing wrong with clever outlines, alliteration, and illustration ... however, none of these are proper substitutes for the clear and concise declaration of "thus saith the Lord."




Biblical Preaching is text-driven preaching.


It starts with the Text. It stays with the Text. It says what the Text says. It stops where the Text stops.

Expository Preaching explains what the Bible means, by what the Bible says.











There are numerous ways to preach an Expository Sermon.

1. Sequential Exposition

- This is verse-by-verse through entire books of the Bible.

- You begin at CH 1 VS 1 and you don't stop until you get to the end.

- IMO ... This should be the *"meat and potatoes of the ministry."*
- If for no other reason... than this is HOW GOD WROTE THE BIBLE!
- Also provides the most balanced "diet" for the sheep.

Overview of Expository Preaching

2. Sectional Exposition

- This is preaching through a "section" or portion of book.
- You identify a segment of Scripture, and preach it.
 - ie. "The Sermon on the Mount."
 - The "Armor of God."
 - The "Fruit of the Spirit."
 - The "7 church of Asia Minor."

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Overview of Expository Preaching

3. Topical Exposition

- This is taking a subject and expounding upon it.

- ie. The Attributes of God.
 - The Family
- The Doctrines of Grace
- The duties of church Membership
 - The Tabernacle

- HOWEVER, you do not use the Text as a "springboard" to say whatever it is you want to say... but instead you only say what the Text says about that subject.

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4. Biographical Exposition:

- These are character studies.
- i.e. King David John the Baptist
 - Elijah Joseph
 - Apostle Paul Jesus
- Again, you say what the Bible says about these individuals.
 - You expound the Text.
 - You open up the Scripture.

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Overview of Expository Preaching

5. Specific Verse(s) Exposition

- This is taking one verse, or one unit of thought and expounding on them.
- Perhaps there is a current event that demands pulpit attention.
- An issue in the church that needs to be addressed.
 - ie. Church Discipline
 - Terrorism A natural disaster
 - Seasonal Sermons Holidays

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Overview of Expository Preaching


HOWEVER, in every case, **the only authority** we have

is what God's Word has to say.

- You may have some good advice.
 - You may be "right."
- You may be the voice of reason.
- But if you are not basing your message on what is actually on the page, you are just a person with a platform.
 - You are Just Jerry.







A commitment to Expository Preaching (at its most fundamental theological core) is the teacher/preacher's unyielding confidence in the sufficiency of Scripture.
