## "Feed My Sheep" John 21:15-19

Jesus calls Peter to fulfill his ministry.

## 1. Jesus' Three-fold Question

vv. 15-17

(1) Certainly calls to mind Peter's denials – his great fall

Yet, - Peter has been restored; forgiveness is not in question!

- Peter is fully confident in Jesus' love and acceptance cf. v. 7

- (2) Self-examination is still necessary!
  - -1- A fuller reconciliation with his brothers

"Simon, son of Jonah,

do you love Me more than these?"

- Peter had *previously claimed* that his love and devotion to be superior.
- He will no longer make such claims!
- -2- Peter surely has a better knowledge of himself!
- -3- A fuller submission to Jesus' knowledge of him and Jesus' estimation of his love
  - He had previously disagreed with Jesus' assessment of him!
     Peter thought he knew himself well. He did not!

## 2. Jesus' Three-fold Charge

"Feed My lambs...Tend My sheep...Feed My sheep."

- (1) Assurance
  - Peter not set aside! Not "demoted!"
  - Now more valuable than ever! Now particularly fit to serve!
- (2) Great Privilege!
  - To care for the flock of Christ!
  - Peter never forgot these words! cf. 1 Peter 5

## 3. Jesus' Prophecy concerning Peter

v. 18

(1) The absolute certainty of this prophecy – as it comes from Jesus' lips.

"Most assuredly, I say to you..."

- Just as certain as Jesus' prediction of Peter's denials, is this prediction of his faithful service unto death! cf. 13:38

(2) Peter - a changed man!

-1- From self-sufficiency "when you were younger,

and independency... you girded yourself and walked where you wished"

- Peter used to do his own thing! He used to be self-dependent!

-2- To trust in Jesus

"but when you are old, you will stretch out your hands,

and another will gird you and carry you

where you do not wish."

- total dependency on Jesus!Now a follower of Jesus!
- Now a child-like dependence!
- (3) Faithful service unto death! v. 19 "This He spoke, signifying by what death he would glorify God."
- (4) The Needful Command "Follow Me."
