# The Willful Rejection of the Testimony of Christ Deity John 5:30-40

<sup>30</sup> "I can do nothing on my own. As I hear, I judge, and my judgment is just, because I seek not my own will but the will of him who sent me. <sup>31</sup> If I alone bear witness about myself, my testimony is not true. 32 There is another who bears witness about me, and I know that the testimony that he bears about me is true. <sup>33</sup> You sent to John, and he has borne witness to the truth. <sup>34</sup> Not that the testimony that I receive is from man, but I say these things so that you may be saved. 35 He was a burning and shining lamp, and you were willing to rejoice for a while in his light. <sup>36</sup> But the testimony that I have is greater than that of John. # Introduction:

After signing an executive order earlier this month that seeks to relax restrictions on the political activities of tax-exempt churches, President Trump said the order was an important affirmation of the American identity. "We're a nation of believers," he said. Trump is right in one sense — 69 percent of Americans say a belief in God is an important part of being American — but he's wrong demographically:

Atheists constitute a culturally significant part of American society.

.....a new study suggests that the true number of atheists could be much larger, perhaps even 10 times larger than previously estimated.

The authors of the study, published earlier this year, adopted a novel way to measure atheist identity. Instead of asking about belief in God directly, they provided a list of seemingly innocuous statements and then asked: "How many of these statements are true of you?" Respondents in a control group were given a list of nine statements, such as "I own a dog" and "I am a vegetarian." The test group received all the same statements plus one that read, "I do not believe in God." The totals from the test group were then compared to those from the control group, allowing researchers to estimate the number of people who identify as atheists without requiring any of the respondents to directly state that they don't believe in God."

The study concludes that roughly one-quarter (26 percent) of Americans likely do not believe in God.<sup>2</sup>

While this result is fairly stunning and not consistent with any published survey results, there is good reason to suspect that

more direct measures significantly underestimate the number of atheists.

The American religious tapestry is continually being restitched as new religious groups slowly gain acceptance. Atheists have been on the fringe for quite some time.

They remain one of the country's most disliked "religious" groups: Only 30 percent of Americans have a "warm" view of atheists. Research has also shown that even as America has grown increasingly accepting of religious diversity, atheists have been the exception.

Americans express a considerable degree of intolerance toward atheists. More than half of Americans believe atheists should not be allowed to put up public displays that celebrate their beliefs (for example, a banner highlighting Americans' freedom from religion under the Bill of Rights). More than one-third believe atheists should be banned from becoming president, and similar numbers believe they should be denied the opportunity to teach in public schools or the right to hold a rally.

And therein lies the problem: The stigma attached to the atheist label may prevent Americans from claiming it or sharing their beliefs with others. In certain parts of the country, pressure to conform to prevailing religious practices and beliefs is strong. A reporter with The Telegraph writing from rural Virginia, for example, found that for many atheists, being closeted makes a lot of sense. "The stakes are high," said a Virginia Tech graduate who was raised Christian but is now an atheist. "Do I want to be supported by my friends and family, or am I going to risk being kicked out of clubs and organizations? It's tempting just to avoid the whole issue."

The fear of coming out shows up in polling too. A 2016 PRRI survey found that more than one-third of atheists reported hiding their religious identity or beliefs from friends and family members out of concerns that they would disapprove.

But if atheists are hiding their identity and beliefs from close friends and family members, how many might also refuse to divulge this information to a stranger? This is a potentially significant problem for pollsters trying to get an accurate read on the number of atheists in the U.S. It is well documented that survey respondents tend to overreport their participation in socially desirable behavior, such as voting or attending religious services. But at least when it comes to religious behavior, the problem is not that people who occasionally attend are claiming to be in the pews every week, but that those who never attend often refuse to say so. Americans who do not believe in God might be exhibiting a similar reticence and thus go uncounted.

Another challenge is that many questions about religious identity require respondents to select a single description from a list. This method, followed by most polling firms including PRRI (where I work as research director), does not allow Americans to identify simultaneously as Catholic and atheist. Or Jewish and atheist. But there are Catholics, Jews and Muslims who do not believe in God — their connection to religion is largely cultural or based on their ethnic background. When PRRI ran an experiment in 2014 that asked about atheist identity in a standalone question that did not ask about affiliation with any other religious group, we found that 7 percent of the American public claimed to be atheist. Asking people about God in a multiple-choice format is self-evidently problematic. Conceptions of God vary substantially

and are inherently subjective. Does a belief in mystical energy, for example, constitute a belief in God? When Gallup recently asked a yes-or-no question about belief in God, 89 percent of Americans reported that they do believe. But, in a separate poll, only slightly more than half (53 percent) of Americans said they have an anthropomorphic God in mind, while for other believers it's something far more abstract.

Many survey questions also do not leave much room for expressions of doubt. When PRRI probed those feelings of uncertainty, we found that 27 percent of the public including nearly 40 percent of young adults — said they sometimes have doubts about the existence of God. Attitudes about atheists are quickly changing, driven by the same powerful force that transformed opinion on gay rights: More and more people know an atheist personally, just as the number of people who report having a gay friend or family member has more than doubled over the past 25 years or so. Despite the fears that some nonbelievers have about coming out, 60 percent of Americans report knowing an atheist. Ten years ago, less than half the public reported knowing an atheist. Today, young adults are actually more likely to know an atheist than an evangelical Christian. These personal connections play a crucial role in reducing negative feelings. A decline in stigma may also encourage more atheists to come out. This would allow us to provide a more accurate estimate of atheists in the U.S. — is it 3 percent, 10 percent, or 26 percent? — and could fundamentally change our understanding of the American religious landscape. LOOK at Eph. 2

- **2:1** And you *He made alive*, who were dead in trespasses and sins.
  - 2 in which you once walked according to the course of this world, according to the prince of the power of the air, the spirit who now works in the sons of disobedience.
  - 3 among whom also we all once conducted ourselves in the lusts of our flesh, fulfilling the desires of the flesh and of the mind, and were by nature children of wrath, just as the others.

### It is a nature issue

Were (emetha) is imperfect tense, which speaks of continuous action or state of being. Our totally depraved condition before salvation was a continuous one, from birth on without a cessation of that condition.

By nature (5449) (phusis/physis from phúo = to bring forth) (note contrast with "by grace" in Eph 2:5-note) refers to that which is innate and implanted in one by nature. It refers to our natural condition and means that we didn't have to develop to become children of wrath. "By nature" denies any process of development so that we were born with the destiny of children of wrath.

### phusis: nature

**Definition:** nature, inherent nature, origin, birth.

5449 *phýsis* – properly, inner *nature*, the underlying constitution or make-up of someone (something).

"Nature," in *Greek*, implies that which has *grown* in us as the peculiarity of our being, growing with our growth, and strengthening with our strength, as distinguished from that which has been wrought on us by mere external influences: what is inherent, not acquired (Job 14:4; Ps 51:5). An incidental proof of the doctrine of original sin.

### Spurgeon once said

"He who doubts human depravity had better begin to study himself." **Comment**: Or simply look in the mirror each morning!

**Children** (5043) (**teknon** from **tikto** = to give birth to) is a word for children that emphasizes the birth relationship. Paul's point is that we were born children having Adam's depraved nature (Ro 5:12) and were thus fully deserving of the wrath of God.

**Children of wrath** could be rephrased "children destined for wrath." We were worthy of and subject to God's wrath. Praise God that in Christ He provided a way of escape from our imprisonment in Adam!

- 17 This I say, therefore, and testify in the Lord, that you should no longer walk as the rest of the Gentiles walk, in the futility of their mind,
- having their understanding darkened, being alienated from the life of God, because of the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart;

"In light of this I suggest a change in our approach. We have been saying prophecy has been fulfilled, the Bible is scientifically accurate, miracles were performed with eyewitnesses, the biblical message of salvation through faith in Jesus Christ results in a revolutionary change in the lives of persons who believe. Because of all these proofs, we reason the Bible is the Word of God."

And then I wrote, "Instead, I propose that we declare the Bible is the Word of God, therefore prophecy has been fulfilled, miracles have taken place, scientific statements are accurate and lives have been transformed."

Listen to John Calvin. "The Scriptures alone exist as the means by which God has been pleased to consign His truth to perpetual remembrance. The full authority, which they obtain with the faithful, proceeds from no other consideration than that they are persuaded that they, the words of Scripture, proceeded from heaven as if God had been heard giving utterance to them." This he says in his *Institutes*.

He further says, "The Scriptures themselves manifest plainly that God is the speaker. We are never established in the faith of this doctrine until we are indubitably persuaded that God is the author. Being illuminated therefore by Him – " that is the Holy Spirit – "we no longer believe either on our own judgment or that of others that Scripture is from God, but in a way that surpasses human judgment we are perfectly assured that it has come to us by the ministry of men from the very mouth of God. We feel the

firmest conviction that we hold an invincible truth, this by the Holy Spirit."

William Niesel said that Calvin considers the word of the Bible, quote, "As a dead and ineffectual thing for us if it is not divinely vivified – " given life – "and so soon as it is separated from Him – " that is, Christ – "it becomes a dead body of letters without soul." He understood that you only believe the Scripture when the Spirit of God gifts you with that faith and confidence.

Confident trust in the Word of God and the Scripture is then not the result of rational arguments and the work of human intellect and reason or emotion. It is the work of the Spirit in the heart.

Our confidence in the Word of God comes from the Spirit of God. It is a component of the sovereign gift of regeneration.

Traditional approaches have been to try to prove the Bible to unregenerate people by amassing all kinds of evidences that they can process through their fallen intellects in the futility of their mental function and the ignorance that is in them and the darkness of their mind and the hardness of their heart and the callousness and sensuality of their soul. We can amass all the prophetic evidences, scientific evidence, miraculous evidence, historical archeological evidence, the evidences of transformed lives.

And in the end, while certainly all of those are reasonable and a true representation of Scripture, they cannot take the scales off the blind eyes; they cannot give life to the dead soul.
