- I. The Message: The Gospel of the Kingdom (9:35; 4:23)
- II. The Compassion of Jesus (9:35-36; Isa 53:3-4; Heb 4:15)
- III. The Spiritual Diagnosis: Like Sheep Without a Shepherd (9:36; Num 27:15-17; 1 Kings 22:17; Ezek 34:5; Isa 53:6; 1 Peter 2:25)
- IV. The Promising Problem: The Harvest is Plentiful, but the Laborers are Few (9:37; John 4:35; Acts 18:9-10)
- V. The Response: Pray! (9:38; Luke 18:1, 7-8; 1 Thes 5:17; Rom 12:12; Matt 10; 28:18-20)

"Sheep are defenseless animals. Without a shepherd they are vulnerable to any attack. . . . Goats manage very well by themselves, but sheep do not. Sheep without a shepherd points to people who are in great danger and without the resources to escape from it." —Leon Morris
