## The Hero of Our Afflictions (Part 2) 1 Peter 3:18-22 Reading: Psalm 110

### Turn w/ me & let's read 1 Peter 3:13-22

- A. In vv. **13-17** Peter urged his friends to *sanctify* Christ as Lord, and to *fearlessly maintain a clear conscience*, even when their godly lives were met with *opposition & suffering*.
- B. Hey, that's a tall order: to do right, to get beat up, to do right again!
- C. So the Apostle immediately *draws their attention* to their Lord.
- D. Here is *hope*, here is *strength*: Jesus *suffered*, Jesus *endured*, and Jesus *conquered*! *So will you*!
- E. Peter's words *trace the progress* of Jesus' victory; beloved, when we submit to God's will, we *trace the steps* of Jesus' victory:
- **F.** This evening we'll continue to consider:
- G. Four events in Jesus' temporary suffering & ultimate victory:
  - 1. Crucifixion: The purpose of Christ's suffering (18). \*
  - 2. Death: The proclamation of Christ's victory (19-20). \*
  - 3. Resurrection: The foundation of Christ's salvation (21).
  - 4. Ascension: The culmination of Christ's victory (22).
  - \* Two weeks ago...

Here is Peter's lesson: remember Christ's victory! Take hope & stand firm when **you** suffer for righteousness sake.

## I & II Reviewed:

- A. *Crucifixion*: The *purpose* of Christ's *suffering*.
  - a. Peter essentially reviews the *Gospel* for us, doesn't he?
  - b. Do you see it in v. **18**? (This verse is *packed!*)
    - i. Atonement: He died for sins.
    - ii. Acceptable payment: He was just.
    - iii. Substitutionary payment: The just for the unjust.
    - iv. Reconciliation: so that He might bring us to God.
    - v. *Historic death* (it *really* happened): *put to death in the flesh*.
    - vi. *Historic resurrection* (it *really* happened): *made alive* (*spirit* &, v. 21-22, *body*).
  - c. Christ died for your sins to allow you to have a relationship with our holy & merciful God.
  - d. Of course, Peter's friends *knew all that*, but the apostle wanted them to *remember this*: when Christ is your Lord, *when troubles come*, God has *purpose* in your *suffering*.
  - e. The first event on the timeline of Christ's suffering & victory is His crucifixion; Jesus died once to bring sinners to His Father.

- B. 2<sup>nd</sup> event: *death* ... *Death* and the proclamation of Christ's victory (19-20).
  - a. Where did He go? Vv. 19-20 examine where Jesus went in His Spirit, the moment He breathed His last breath.
  - b. He went *down*!
    - i. (We also know He went *up*, to Paradise, and welcomed the repentant *Thief on the Cross...*) "*This day, you will...*"
    - ii. But v. 19 tells us that He also went down to the prisonholds of darkness. → "Tartarus" "hardness" A maximum security prison for fallen angels.
  - c. And appearing in that dark place, *Death's Conqueror* proclaimed His triumph to His *incarcerated enemies*: *vile*, *fallen angels* from the days of *Noah*. Held in bonds until the *final judgment*.
  - d. That's an *amazing story*; *here* is what God wants you to understand: He can bring *victory* out of *suffering*. (2X)
  - e. The second event on the timeline of our Lord's suffering & victory is His proclamation to His enemies: Christ has conquered!
- C. So we've seen that suffering does **not** cancel God's purpose or derail His victory. Not for Jesus...not for you & me.

# D. III. Resurrection: The *foundation* of Christ's salvation (21).

- A. Now with these ideas of *purpose & conquest* suggested in **vv.19&20**, Peter turns to the **3**<sup>rd</sup> event on Christ's timeline of *suffering & victory* His *resurrection* from the grave (21).
- B. Don't miss this from v. **20**: only a *few* were saved in the days of *Noah* (just **8**).
  - a. So Peter's *friends*, who often feel like *outnumbered* outsiders...
  - b. ... are reminded that even if they **are** *pilgrims in this life*, God can deliver *them* from *their* suffering. And, w/ God, a *few* are *enough*.
- E. Yet Peter's words, if not read carefully & understood rightly, could cause us some theological heartburn (follow in your NT while I read v. 21): Is the apostle teaching that the ordinance of water baptism saves us from our sins!?!
- F. *Not at all*! Let me give you *three reasons* from this text why baptism does *not* save:

first...

- 1. Peter says baptism is an *outward picture* of an *inward reality*.
  - a. Peter describes baptism as an "antitype." Though that exact word may not appear in your Bible; perhaps its translated:
    - i. "corresponding to" ..or...
    - ii. "symbolizes"
    - iii. So, NASB: "Corresponding to that ... "
  - b. Peter's meaning is that baptism is only an *outer* symbol ("antitype") of our inner turning **from** sin & **to** God, thru faith in Jesus Christ.

#### second...

- 2. The apostle says that a washing ritual is **not** what saves!
  - a. Look with me in the middle of v. 21: ...not the removal of dirt from the flesh... (2X)
  - b. This is like a parenthetic note in the middle of the text
  - c. It's as if Peter wants to make his point *very clear*: *deliverance from sin is not found in the symbol!*

### third, and this is very important as we remember Christ's victory ...

- Peter says salvation is not based on an *outer picture* (or *symbolic observance*), *but* finds its foundation in the *resurrection* of Jesus Christ, our crucified *Savior* (reread v. 21).
  - a. Your salvation is not *secured* by what *you've* done,
  - b. It's completely dependent on *trusting* in what Christ has *accomplished* in His death & burial & *resurrection*!
- G. So *if* believer's baptism doesn't save, *if* it's just a *symbolic observance* ("*antitype*"), what *is* baptism's significance?
  - a. Do you see that word "appeal" (or, "answer" KJV) in the middle of v. 21?
  - b. Peter employs the language of *contracts* which describes baptism as a *pledge*.
  - c. Baptism allows the a new Christian to make a *pledge* to God to live a life that results in a *clear conscience*, and therefore a life that *honors God*.
  - d. The *collateral* for the believer's pledge is **not** the *currency* of his own goodness, it's the *saving value* of the *resurrection* of Jesus Christ from the dead.

- H. Beloved, just think of what this does to a shallow view of salvation!
  - a. To identify yourself as a *follower of Jesus* (as in by *believer's baptism*) is to pledge to live your life in a way that *pleases Him*.
  - b. *Not* to simply grab your eternal *fire insurance*, and then heedlessly live *any which way you please*.
  - c. To follow Jesus is full of *grace*, full of *wonder* & full of *weight*!

Here is the progress of Christ's Suffering & Victory:

Sin-atoning Crucifixion...

Hell-defeating Proclamation...

Life-changing Resurrection...

## IV. Ascension: The culmination of Christ's victory (read 22).

A. In Psalm **110:1** *King David* pens his poem under the *inspiration* of the Holy Spirit, and David *anticipates* the *ascension* of the resurrected Messiah to the right hand of **YHWH** (Jehovah God):

The LORD says to my Lord:

"Sit at My right hand

Until I make Your enemies a footstool for Your feet."

(The most quoted **OT** verse in the **NT**!)

- B. Now (22) Peter reminds us that the *ascension & enthronement* (coronation) of our Lord Jesus Christ is the *fourth* event on His *timeline to victory*.
  - a. Luke documents the Ascension with these words from Acts 1:9-11:

And after He had said these things, He was lifted up while they were looking on, and a cloud received Him out of their sight. And as they were gazing intently into the sky while He was going, behold, two men in white clothing stood beside them. They also said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into the sky? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in just the same way as you have watched Him go into heaven."

- b. Do you believe this *really* happened? *You must!* What part of the Gospel do you think you can *jettison*, and still have an *Ark* that will deliver from you from *God's wrath*?
- C. Peter uses exactly the same Greek term here in v. **22** that he used in v. **19**: "having gone," or "He went." What's my point? What's Peter's point?
  - a. Just as Christ *went* in His *spirit* to proclaim His victory to fallen angels (*defeated foes*)... (vv. **19-20**)
  - b. ...our Lord Jesus then went in His resurrected body to take His place of honor & glory at the **right hand** of God.

- D. And don't miss *this*: Christ proclaimed His victory to spirits *shackled* in *pits of darkness*, then our Lord took His *place* at the Father's *right hand*, and as a result fallen spirits everywhere (v.22):
  - a. angels & authorities & powers...
  - b. ...(the entire array of Satan's forces)...
  - c. ...are now & forever placed in *subjugation* to our Lord. Heb 1:13 His *enemies* are His *footstool*!
- E. Submission & suffering. Christ submitted Himself to the will of God in **His** suffering,
  - a. and now all of His enemies are at His feet.
  - b. Christ has ascended; Christ is seated in glory, His victory is complete!

# V. In the *darkest* circumstances, God can bring the *greatest* victories. Remember Peter's timeline:

- A. Jesus Christ, *completely righteous*, suffered an *underserved* **death**.
  - a. And despite every *sincere* effort to live a godly life, *you* sometimes suffer.
  - b. But think of Jesus: when you suffer, that is **not** a sign that God no longer cares for you. He cared for His own dear Son!
- C. Yet Jesus *triumphed* and *declared* His *victory* over His *wicked* & *plotting* enemies. *In Christ*, your ultimate triumph is *also assured*.
- D. Christ was raised from the dead; Christian, you are raised to walk in newness of life.
- E. Christ has **gone into Heaven**, He is at the right hand of the Majesty on high. Christian, in some mystical way that words can't fully explain, **you** are seated there with Him.

Therefore if you have been raised up with Christ, keep seeking the things above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your mind on the things above, not on the things that are on earth. For you have died and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ, who is our life, is revealed, then you also will be revealed with Him in glory. (2X) Col 3:1-4
