## The Race of Faith

Hebrews 12:1-3
Reading: 1 Corinthians 9:19-27

1. Let's step into a new section of Hebrews. Follow as I read 12:1-3.
2. The writer of Hebrews has just ushered us out through the exit of The Faith Hall of Fame (ch.11).
a. But right outside the Halls' exit is another stop. Except it's not a stop, it's a start.
b. We are now standing at the starting line of a race - the race of the Christian life, the race of faith.
c. Maybe we should call it: The Celestial City Marathon!
3. Every Christian is summoned to the starting line. The race is long. The course is sometimes demanding. But the finish line is drawn in the courts of heaven!
4. The strength you need to win is found in faith. Faith fueled by examples of faith.

Five coaching points for winning the race of faith.<br>Step up (v.1).<br>Put off (v.1).<br>Run hard (v.1).<br>Look to (v.2).<br>Finish strong (v.3).

## Step up (v.1).

5. The most important words in these beloved verses are simply these:"let us run with endurance." Christian, you are in a race.
a. This is not a stroll or a fun run. It's not even a short, intense, sprint.
b. When you turned to Jesus and trusted Him to save you, you agreed to run a marathon of faith.
c. In fact, the Gr. word translated "race" is $\boldsymbol{\alpha} \rho \gamma \omega v$ (2X), which relates to the idea of agony. Your race is a long, demanding endurance run.
6. But despite the fact our race is long, \& sometimes hard, make no mistake it is exactly the race God has charted for you.
a. V.1(b) - assures us the race is "set before us." God is the clerk of the course, the race judge, the starter, and the referee all in one!
b. Every hurdle, every hill, every water pit, every long stretch is right where it is because God set it there.
c. As you picture God preparing your race for you, including all the obstacles, remember this promise ( Rm 8:28): God causes all things to work together for good, for those who love Him, for those who are called according to His purpose.
i. God has set your course; our Father has measured your race w/ holy purpose!
7. Despite the idea of "agony" hinted at here, some people actually like to run.....! But most generally avoid it! Which means you have some strong motivation to step $u p$ to the starting line.
a. Our text (1-3) offers two motivators to run by faith, and we've already looked very carefully at the first (we'll consider the second in a few minutes). The first motivation is all those heroes in the Hall of Fame!
b. The heroes of old are the reference (1) of "Therefore, since we have so great a cloud of witnesses ..."
i. Ch. 11 featured 28 specific saints, and an entire dream team of prophets! There wasn't time enough to even name them all!
ii. They followed the Messiah, the better Mediator of the better promise, ... by faith.
iii. Now they are called on as witnesses.
c. It is popular \& tempting to think the picture in v. 1 is of an audience of spectators, watching you \& cheering for your race after they've run theirs.
i. But, the Gr. word translated witnesses" here came to have $\mathbf{3}$ possible meanings: spectator, testifier, eventually martyr.
ii. The best idea here (1) is witness... testifier. The saints of old are not sitting there eating ball park franks and critiquing your race, they are talking to you about the power of faith!
iii. Christian, as you step up to the line, you are surrounded by an uncountable cloud of men \& women of old (like the dozens of ch.11) who now urge you on, as they give personal testimony to the power of living (running ) "by faith."
iv. By faith, they overcame armies \& lions \& furnaces \& swords \& mockings \& scourgings \& imprisonments \& sometimes death. $\backslash$
v. Their testimony for you is: by faith, we cleared those hurdles, by faith, so can you! ... It is your time to step up to the line!

## Put off (v.1).

1. The runner has a pre-race ritual. He warms up: walking, jogging, stretching. Showing off his fancy warm-up gear \& high-dollar running shoes.
a. But minutes before the race he has second ritual. He puts off...
b. The runner put off and lay aside those fancy sweats. No matter what the temperature, he wears as little as possible (the ancient Greek athletes wore even less than that..!) That stuff is extra baggage.
c. He lays aside his training shoes \& laces on his feather light racers.
d. He lays aside all the binding clothes \& extra weight, no matter how flashy or warm it is!
2. Our text (1) calls us to prepare to step up and run by laying aside our encumbrances and our sin.
a. Let us also lay aside every encumbrance.
i. The picture is of extra weight. Extra weight slows you down.
ii. The encumbrance might not explicitly be sin, at least not for everyone, but you know it's distracting you in your Christian walk! Perhaps it's a habit, a relationship, a hobby.
iii. Beloved, if your interest has become a spiritual encumbrance, it's time to lay it aside and step up to the starting line!
b. Let us also lay aside the sin which so easily entangles us.
i. The reality is that living the Christian life while embracing sin is like trying to run the Boston marathon with leg-shackles!
ii. Every commentary points out that v. 1 reads: "the sin which so easily entangles us...the sin." As in, the specific sin.
3. Any/all sin slows you down, but some of you have habitual sins ("besetting sins").
4. You must determine to break your habitual sin, the evil that trips you up, time and again (e.g.):
a. Wrong relationships. Bad company corrupts good morals (1 Cor 15:33). Purge your Friends List!
b. Impure thoughts \&actions. Beloved, pornography is addictive! ... The immoral woman(man) lures you off the narrow way (Proverbs)
c. Intractable pride (= "I am the gold standard of excellence"). Pride goes before a fall. God is opposed to the proud but gives grace to the ...
d. Untamed tongue. Our words make us stumble (Jas 3). Don't trip over your tongue!
5. Now before we run on, let's recognize where our marathon illustration might need some further explanation. The athlete (1) generally lays aside every encumbrance and $\sin$ before he starts the race.
a. You \& I need to do the same, but we also need to be laying aside the sin we encounter every lap of life's race. All the time!
b. Martin Luther taught that the entire Christian life is one of repentance.
c. You \& I will be tempted every step of the way! You have to keep putting off your sin. ... Put off your sin and run!

## Run hard (v.1).

1. The Bible loves these sports metaphors! Athletics were a big part of GrecoRoman culture, and Paul alone used at least a dozen sporting illustrations. Consider 1 Cor 9:24-27: Do you not know that those who run in a race all run, but only one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may win. Everyone who competes in the games exercises self-control in all things. They then do it to receive a perishable wreath, but we an imperishable. Therefore I run in such a way, as not without aim; I box in such a way, as not beating the air; but I discipline my body and make it my slave, so that, after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified.
a. The apostle's point is that the Christian race requires discipline because it can be difficult. (Comment on bolded words.)
b. Do you remember the underlying tone of the word for "race" in Hebrews 12:1...? $\alpha \rho \gamma \omega v . .$. a race with a hint of agony.
2. Beloved, our race is hard, so we read in v.1: run with endurance. Two words have appeared over \& over in the second half of Hebrews: faith \& endurance.
a. Read 10:36-39. Comment on $\mathbf{3 6}$ - endurance; $\mathbf{3 8}$ - faith; 39 - faith
b. Don't forget Hebrews 11. Faith's heroes endured life's trials, motived by their faith in God's better promise (Messiah). V. 27 (e.g.)

- Moses endured, as seeing Him (Jesus) who is unseen.
c. Our text this morning: v. 1 -run w/endurance; v. 2 -author \& perfecter of faith; endured the cross; v. 3 - He endured hostility.
d. We get the picture: endurance is essential to finishing faith's marathon and, in fact, faith \& endurance seem inseparable.
$e$. In Hebrews 11 we learned that faith produces courage. It would also seem that faith is the fuel of endurance. One of the by-products of saving faith is "run to the finish line" endurance.

3. How does faith produce endurance? The Gospel is full of promises that when you trust God, He sees you through to the end. Let's consider one promise from the OT \& one from the NT:
a. OT: Isa 40:31-Yet those who wait for the Lord will gain new strength; they will mount up with wings like eagles, they will run and not get tired, they will walk and not become weary.
i. New strength ...wings like eagles, untired running, unwearied walking... That sounds like the marathon of faith!
ii. How do we get new strength...? As we "wait for the LORD" i.e., by faith!
b. NT: Jude 24 (turn) - Now to Him who is able to keep you from stumbling, and to make you stand in the presence of His glory blameless with great joy,
i. Who is the object of Jude's promise (...keep you)? Christians - men \& women w/ faith in Jesus. You and me!
ii. How will you run the race? Without stumbling!
iii. How will you be at the end? Standing! Blameless! Joyful!
iv. Where will the finish line be marked? Where does this life's race of faith end? In the presence of His glory!

The course is long \& sometimes hard - you'll need faith to endure. And you will!

## Look to (v.2).

1. A pillar was placed at the finish line of the marathon of the ancient Greek athletic games. A wreath was hung on the pillar - that wreath was the victor's prize, it was every runner's motivation to run hard and finish the race!
a. Our text points us to two motivations to run by faith.
b. The first (1) is the examples of the heroes of faith (ch.11), but now there is an even greater motivator to get in the race: Jesus.
2. But how is Jesus our motivator? Let's read v.2...
3. First, we are inspired by His great race of enduring faith!
a. What does every aspiring young athlete do after watching the Super Bowl or World Cup or World Series or Winter Olympics or Olympic Marathon? He goes out the door and heads to the field! Championships \& champions inspire us!
b. Jesus has perfect faith (He is perfect in every virtue) and that means He is the greatest "faith marathoner" of all time!
c. He is the "author and perfecter of faith" (NASB) and that can also be translated as the "leader and finisher of the faith." Jesus started and led and won the race of the faith, and now He calls you to follow in His footsteps.
4. Second, Jesus understands that the race is intimidating. His own course was agonizing and shameful.
a. Our Lord endured the cross. For six hours He hung there. For three of those hours He agonized, forsaken, under God's judgment - for us. His first words were: "Father, forgive them ..." His last were: "Into Thy hands I commend My spirit." And then He breathed His last.
b. But it wasn't just death, or even the physical cruelty of the cross. On the cross, the Son of God endured shame for us.
i. Death by crucifixion was the lowest form of disgrace imaginable. Roman law protected even the lowest criminal from crucifixion if he was a Roman citizen. A cross was so shameful it would besmirch the honor of Roman citizenship.
ii. And on Calvary, our Savior heard these taunting words: "He trusts in God - let God rescue Him! (Mt 27:43)" "Come down from the cross, and we will believe (Mk 15:30, 32). Even the criminals crucified beside Him found the energy to taunt Him.
iii. Then at the end of the day, they hurried Jesus' body off the cross and into a borrowed tomb.
c. But Jesus endured while despising ("counting as nothing") a criminal's shame and taunting words.
5. And by that shameful death, the crucified One secured His joy, and ours.
a. The ancient athlete ran to exhaustion for a perishing wreath. The modern marathoner trains for months \& runs for a medal.
b. Jesus ran for joy! The joy of knowing He'd accomplished exactly what God had sent Him to accomplish. "It is finished!"
i. Finished: To die on the cross in the place of His people to pay for their sins.
ii. Finished: By that one payment to provide complete forgiveness and $a$ new heart and eternal life.
iii. OTBW, the only condition to entering into the life-transforming joy of Jesus' death \& resurrection is your faith, by trusting God that it's all true!
c. Again, Jesus ran for joy! The joy of entering into the heavenly of heavenlies and being seated at the right hand of God.
i. This is an echo of almost the very first truth Hebrews taught us about Jesus! 1:3-after making propitiation for sins He sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high!
ii. God's right hand is the place of honor (God's Son, victor) and authority (all things under His feet) and priestly intercession (thus He lives to make intercession forever for the saints).
6. Friends, the call is to step $u p$ to the line, start the race, and run all the way to the finish line because though the race is hard, others have run it.
a. Abel and Abraham and Moses and David and Jeremiah.
b. Yet above all these, fix your eyes on Jesus, the Crucified and Risen One. Jesus, the leader of the heroic field of faithful saints. Jesus, the first across the finish line of the faith.

## Listen to Him...look to Him...run after Him!

## Finish strong (read v.3).

1. Do you ever feel like leaving the Christian faith? Do you know anyone who has?
a. The first churches to read Hebrews were filled with people who were considering dropping out of the race. Too much pressure, too much shame.
b. Maybe that's why the call is repeated: Consider Him...
c. Except IN the original language it's even more intense than in v.1\& 2 .
d. And the focus has narrowed from running the race, even enduring the race, to fighting the temptation to quit the race: having grown weary and lost heart.
2. There are many valuable, even vital, helps to Christian living, but the most important must be this: consider Jesus!
a. Of all the true \& necessary things to know about Jesus (deity, incarnation, resurrection, ascension, intercession, return)...
b. When you are tired of life and trials and yes, even your religion, look long and hard at what Jesus endured for you!
i. The perfect Son of God willingly endured the enmity of unworthy sinners. The suffering and shame of the cross.
ii. The hostility of the very women \& men He came to die for!
3. $\operatorname{Rm} \mathbf{5 : 8}$ - For God demonstrates His own love for us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us!
iii. Beloved, He suffered \& died for you! And when you want to quit, a look at Jesus is spiritual Red Bull for your weary soul!

So that you may not grow weary and lose heart... so that you might not drop out of the race.

## Why do people refuse to start, or fail to finish, the race of faith!

One reason suggested this morning is shame.
The NT admits \& warns that the cross invites shame on its followers.
It's true! Here is what society thinks about you...
You are naïve if you believe the Bible is true.
You are a theological bigot if you repeat Jesus' exclusive claim that no man comes to the Father but by Me.

You can't be cool and be sexually pure.
You certainly won't be tolerated if you insist on a biblical definition of marriage: one man and woman united in a covenant relationship before God; everything else is a version of fornication/adultery.

You are now even labeled as "Unchristian" if you speak out against abortion!

Beloved, take heart! Jesus suffered shame for you! He calls you to follow His footsteps. The race may be hard. The reward will be worth it.

Look to Him. Despise the shame. Endure the Cross. Finish the course.
Others have done it before you. Jesus did it for you!

## You can do it, too! You must....
