Introduction:

"For the choir director, A Maskil of the sons of Korah."

"A Maskil" – found in 13 psalms. It may be a designation for a teaching poem/psalm.

"Of the Sons of Korah" – They were descendants of Kohath, son of Levi, who served in the temple as musicians. (1Chron. 6:22, 31-32)

Whereas Psalms 42-43 are personal lament psalms, Psalm 44 is a psalm of national lament due to military defeat.

I. Recalling the Stories of God's Favor, "In the Days of Old" (1-3)

The current generation has heard from their fathers the stories of how God drove out the nations from the land of Canaan by His great power and how He planted His favored people in the land and caused them to spread throughout the land.

Joshua 4:20-24; 21:43-45

[&]quot;For You favored them" "delighted in them" (ESV)

II. Personal Confession of Confidence in God, the King (4-8)

Confession: "You are my King, O God" (4)

Psalms 5:2; 9:7-10; 10:16-18; 11:4-7; 93:1-2; 96:10; 145:1-2, 11-12

Their confidence is not in their own might and abilities but in God in whom they praise and give thanks.

Zech. 4:6 "...This is the word of the LORD to Zerubbabel saying, "Not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit," says the LORD of hosts."

III. Confusion and Complaint before God for Current Circumstances (9-16)

They understand that God, as King, is sovereign over all things. Their current situation has caused them to present their case before the LORD.

"Yet You have rejected us...brought us to dishonor...You do not go out with Your armies...You cause us to turn back from the adversary....you give us as sheep to be eaten...."

IV. Claim of Covenant Faithfulness (17-22)

¹⁷All this has come upon us, but we have not forgotten You, And we have not dealt falsely with Your covenant.

¹⁸Our heart has not turned back, And our steps have not deviated from Your way, ¹⁹Yet You have crushed us in a place of jackals And covered us with **the shadow of death**.

²⁰If we had forgotten the name of our God Or extended our hands to a strange god,

²¹Would not God find this out? For He knows the secrets of the heart.

²²But for Your sake we are killed all day long; We are considered as sheep to be slaughtered.
