# II. Receive the word – tend your garden. v. 21

- A. Pull the weeds. v. 21a I Pe. 2:1
  - 1. You can't receive the word if you are still engaged in your old life of sin.
  - 2. This is like Paul's exhortations to put off your old self. Eph. 4:22ff Col. 3:8
  - 3. Put off filthiness and the remaining (abundance of) wickedness. 2:2 Zech. 3:3-4 Isa. 64:6 Eph. 4:31 Col. 3:8 I Pe. 2:1,17
- B. Cultivate the implanted word. v. 21b I Pe. 2:2
  - 1. The Lord has already planted His word within you. v. 18 Jer. 31:33 Ezek. 36:36-37
  - 2. You wouldn't be able to fight sin unless the word was already working inside of you. v. 21a Rom. 6:17ff I Jo. 3:9
  - 3. What is your heart's response to God's word? Mark 4:1ff Col. 3:16
  - 4. How can one humbly (meekly) receive God's word? Ps. 1:1ff 25:4-5 119:11 Pr. 3:5-6 2:10 Isa. 57:15 Acts 17:11 8:14 11:1 I Th. 2:13 I Pe. 2:2
  - 5. How do many fail to meekly embrace the word? John 8:37 Mt. 8:12 13:41-42,49f
- C. God's word is powerful and able to save your soul. v. 21c 4:12 Heb. 4:12 9:28 I Jo. 2:14 Phil. 2:12-13 I Pe. 2:1-2 1:5,9 I Th. 5:9 Ro. 5:9-10 13:11

#### III. Be doers of God's word. v. 22-25

- A. Don't be a self-deluded hearer who refuses to act upon God's Word. v. 22
  - 1. Hearing is not enough. Heb. 3:15 John 5:39-40 Mt. 23:1ff II Tim. 3:7
  - 2. Who would want to be religious enough to hear the word without acting upon it?
  - 3. The person who claims to be saved, but does not practice God's word deludes himself. I John 2:3-4 4:7-8 II Pe. 1:10
  - 4. We are not saved by doing the word, but those who are truly saved obey God's word. 2:14-26 3:13 Ro. 2:13
  - 5. James echos Jesus' teaching. Mark 4:1ff Mt. 7:13-27 John 14:15 8:31 15:14 Luke 11:27-28
  - 6. James also echos Old Testament demands that the Word of God be received and acted upon. Ex. 13:3 Num. 15:39 Dt. 8:2 Mal. 4:4 Heb. 4:1ff
- B. James illustrates his point with mirrors. v. 23-25 I Co. 13:12 II Co. 3:18
  - 1. The mirror illustrations are more complex than first meets the eye.
  - 2. The important contrast here is the result of looking -- inaction or action.
- C. The careless hearer is unchanged by his forgetful looking (listening). v. 23-24
  - 1. This man sees himself as he truly is. v. 23
  - 2. But when he walks away, he forgets what he saw. v. 24 Ex. 13:3 Mal. 4:4
  - 3. The result is inaction (and self-deceit). v. 24
- D. The wise hearer is transformed by God's perfect law. v. 25
  - 1. This man gazes intently. John 20:5,11 Luke 24:12 I Pe. 1:12
  - 2. The object of his gaze is the perfect law to what law is James referring? 2:8 John 13:34 Jer. 31:33 Ezek. 36:26f
  - 3. This law is perfect and liberating. Ps. 19:7ff <u>40:8</u> Ro. 6:18,20 8:15 <u>I Jo. 5:3</u> Ga. 4:31 II Co. 3:17 Mt. 11:28-29 II Tim. 3:16-17

- 4. This man does not forget what he saw (heard).
- 5. He acts upon what he has seen (heard). John 13:17
- 6. This man who does God's Word is blessed. v. 25b,12 Mt. 7:24-25 Ps. 119:1 1:1ff
