- Applying the code to persecution of Christians today

Code YELLOW!

A. Sufferings and Christians

- Chance of suffering is very, very slim.
- Suffering persecution may be part of God's will for believers.
- Suffering for what is right results in blessing!—1 Peter 3:14
 - "Blessed" can emphasize both the effect and motive.
 - Jesus Christ promises blessing for those who suffer for Him.
 - Peter experienced blessing for suffering Acts 5:41-42
 - Christian church holds those who suffer in high regard
- The need to be prepared for suffering

B. Suffering and Peter—Acts 4:19-20

- Imprisoned at least twice for his faith
- Ordered not to preach, but continued to do so
- Greatest weakness—folding under pressure

C. Suffering and Christ—the perfect example of one who unjustly suffered and achieved a greater good.—1 Pet. 3:18

- Identification of the "just" and the "unjust"

 a. Jesus Christ as the "righteous One"—1 Pet 2:21-24; Heb. 4:15

 b. The rest of mankind as the "unjust"—Romans 3:9-12, 23
- "Christ also suffered once for sins"
 - Jesus Christ died for OUR sins, not His. Isaiah 53; Rom. 5
 - Jesus Christ is the "propitiation" for our sins—1 John 2:2 b.
 - Therefore Jesus only had to suffer ONCE.
 - Hebrews 10:1-4, 12
 - Not crucified again and again—Hebrews 9:24-28a
 - The FINISHED WORK of Christ!! d.
 - The GREAT EXCHANGE—the "just for the unjust"
- Christ "also suffered... to bring us to God"
 - Sin separates. Severed man's relationship with God
 - Jesus reconciles man with God—Romans 5:8-11
 - Accomplished through His death and resurrection
 - We've been given the ministry of reconciliation—2Cor. 5
