B. God's Grace Comes into Sharper Focus

**Key Idea**

*We are born inherently trusting ourselves but by God's gracious self-revelation we learn to trust in God alone.*

## II. What Does this Story Teach Us about Ourselves?

- A. We are Born with a Sinful Self-Confidence
1. **Esau** - Having no thought for eternity
  2. **Isaac** - Thinking we know better than God
  3. **Rebekah & Jacob** - Thinking we can secure God's blessing by our own cleverness.

### Proverbs 16:9 (NASB)

The mind of man plans his way,  
But the Lord directs his steps.

- B. Our Pride is Utter Folly
1. ...to ignore God
  2. ...to contradict God
  3. ...to try to manipulate God

- C. Our Proper Response – Humility & Faith

### Matthew 16:15-17

He said to them, “But who do you say that I am?”<sup>16</sup> Simon Peter replied, “You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.”<sup>17</sup> And Jesus answered him, “Blessed are you, Simon Bar-Jonah! For *flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father who is in heaven.*

## III. What Does this Story Teach Us about God?

- A. Our Salvation does not Depend on Our Efforts But on God's Promise/Grace

1. God's Glory is Beyond Our Comprehension!

### Romans 9:10-13

And not only so, but also when Rebekah had conceived children by one man, our forefather Isaac,<sup>11</sup> though they were not yet born and had done nothing either good or bad—in order that God's purpose of election might continue, not because of works but because of him who calls—<sup>12</sup> she was told, “The older will serve the younger.”<sup>13</sup> As it is written, “Jacob I loved, but Esau I hated.”

1. Is God Unjust?

### Romans 9:14-24

<sup>14</sup> What shall we say then? Is there injustice on God's part? By no means! <sup>15</sup> For he says to Moses, “I will have mercy on whom I have mercy, and I will have compassion on whom I have compassion.” <sup>16</sup> So then it depends not on human will or exertion, but on God, who has mercy. <sup>17</sup> For the Scripture says to Pharaoh, “For this very purpose I have raised you up, that I might show my power in you, and that my name might be proclaimed in all the earth.” <sup>18</sup> So then he has mercy on whomever he wills, and he hardens whomever he wills.

<sup>19</sup> You will say to me then, “Why does he still find fault? For who can resist his will?” <sup>20</sup> But who are you, O man, to answer back to God? Will what is molded say to its molder, “Why have you made me like this?” <sup>21</sup> Has the potter no right over the clay, to make out of the same lump one vessel for honorable use and another for dishonorable use? <sup>22</sup> What if God, desiring to show his wrath and to make known his power, has endured with much patience vessels of wrath prepared for destruction, <sup>23</sup> in order to make known the riches of his glory for vessels of mercy, which he has prepared beforehand for glory—<sup>24</sup> even us whom he has called
