#### I. Introduction and review.

## II. David is anointed as king over all Israel. v. 1-5

- A. The tribes of Israel seek David as their king. v. 1-2
  - 1. Because he is their flesh and bone. v. 1 Deut. 17:15
  - 2. Because he is a proven leader. v. 2a I Sam. 18:5,13,16,30 29:3 8:20 9:16
  - 3. Because the LORD had appointed him to be shepherd and ruler over Israel. v. 2b 3:18 I Sam. 13:14 16:13 25:30 Ps. 78:70-72 Dt. 17:15 Gen 49:8-10
- B. David makes a covenant with the elders of Israel. v. 3 I Ki. 12 Dt. 17:14-20 I Sa. 10:25 8:10-18
  - 1. The king of Israel is not a typical Oriental despot with unlimited power.
  - 2. David becomes the paradigm of the shepherd-king. v. 2b I Sa. 16:11 Ps. 78:70-72
  - 3. The parallel account describes a coronation feast. I Chron. 12:38-40
- C. Why did it take so long for David to be made king? v. 4-5
  - 1. The people should have recognized him much sooner.
  - 2. David's journey to the throne has been long and hard. I Sam. 16:13
  - 3. David's hardships prepared him for his future elevation to great responsibility.
  - 4. He writes Psalms about his trials and God's faithfulness. Ps. 59 56 34 57 142
  - 5. The LORD keeps His promise, even if the fulfillment is not immediate. Ps. 52:8-9
  - 6. Thirty seems to be an ideal age at which to take on responsibility. Gen. 41:46 Nu. 4:3 Luke 3:23
  - 7. David reigns for forty years. I Sam. 4:18 I Ki. 11:42 Judg. 3:11 5:31 8:28
  - 8. David's ascent continues. 5:6-7:29

### III. How does David's coronation apply to us?

- A. How does this passage speak to how we choose our church leaders?
  - 1. The people of God typically do well when led well and poorly when led poorly.
  - 2. The church, like Israel, often chooses fleshly (Saul-like) rulers who fleece and injure God's flock. Ezek. 34:1ff Jer. 10:21 23:1ff 50:6ff
  - 3. Does God still appoint leaders over us? Acts 20:28 Deut. 17:15
  - 4. How can we know whom God has chosen to lead us? I Tim. 3:1-7 Titus 1:5-9
    - a. Leaders should be closely identified with the people they lead. v. 1b
    - b. Leaders should be men with a proven track record. v. 1b-2 I Tim. 2:6
    - c. They must be qualified and gifted.
  - 5. What is the process by which we recognize our leaders? Acts 14:23 6:3 Titus 1:5ff
  - 6. Our leaders are to shepherd the flock of God. Acts 20:28 I Pe. 5:1ff Ps. 23
    - a. Lead. I Ti. 5:17 Ps. 23:2-3 Heb. 13:17 Ro. 12:8 I Th. 5:12 I Pe. 5:3
    - b. Feed. Ps. 23:5 Acts 20:20 6:4 I Ti. 5:17 3:2 II Ti. 4:1ff I Th. 5:12 Titus 1:9
    - c. Care. Ps. 23:1,5b Heb. 12:13 John 10:11-13 Acts 6:4 20:20 I Pe. 5:3

  - 7. Our leaders are under the LORD's authority as defined by His Word.
  - 8. Why doesn't the church have one strong leader or chief like David? I Pe. 5:4
  - 9. Honor and pray for our leaders. Heb. 13:17 I Th. 5:12
- B. Does this passage apply to how we choose national leaders?
  - 1. Our constitution requires that the President be a natural born citizen (not a foreigner) with some life experience (at least 35 years old). v. 1-2

- 2. Our heritage emphasizes that rulers must not act as self-serving despots, but are under the authority of God and the rule of the law. v. 3 Rom. 13:4 I Pe. 2:14
- 3. The character of rulers matters. Pr. 16:12 29:4,2b 31:3ff 17:7 20:28b 14:34 28:15
- 4. Nations need leaders who will shepherd them instead of fleecing them.
- 5. Ultimately God chooses our political leaders sometimes as a blessing and other times as judgment. Ro. 13:1ff Dan. 2:21 Pr. 21:1
- 6. We are to respect and pray for those whom God has placed over us. Rom. 13:1-7 I Pe. 2:13-17 Mark 12:17 I Ti. 2:1ff.
- 7. We will be sorely disappointed if we look to human rulers as messiahs.

### C. This passage also illustrates how we need to patiently wait on the Lord. Ps. 37:9 94:3

- 1. David had to wait a very long time to receive God's promise. I Sa. 13:14 Ps. 35:17
- 2. We can be tempted to be impatient as we wait for our hopes to be fulfilled.
- 3. Those who aspire to spiritual leadership must patiently wait on the Lord.
- 4. Our hardships are preparing us for what God has for us in the future. Acts 14:22 James 1:2ff I Pe. 2:6ff Heb. 11:13-16,39-40
- 5. God's promises cannot be thwarted, but they may be delayed (from our perspective). Js. 5:7-11 I Cor. 4:5
- 6. We are waiting patiently for the return of our great King Jesus. II Pe. 3:9ff

# IV. The coronation of David point us to Christ (the Anointed One) our King.

- A. Jesus is fully qualified to be our King. Luke 1:32
  - 1. He shares the same flesh as those He serves. v. 1b Dt. 17:15 He. 2:17,14 Ro. 1:3
  - 2. Jesus is a proven leader who shepherds His people. v. 2a Mic. 5:4 I Pe. 5:4 2:25 Eze. 37:24 34:23f Ps. 78:70ff Zec. 13:7 Mt. 26:31 Jo. 10:11,16 He. 13:20 Is. 40:1
  - 3. He is appointed by the Father. v. 2b Deut. 17:15 Is. 42:1 Mt. 12:18 Luke 2:34
  - 4. Jesus alone is worthy to lead His people (flock). Ps. 24:1ff 74:1 77:20 78:52 80:1 95:7 23:1ff Jo. 1:18 10:11,16 6:39 Ezek. 34:23 37:24
- B. Jesus' experience is like that of David.
  - 1. He grew and matured in his younger years as preparation for His public work (which began at age 30). Lu. 2:52 3:23 Heb. 5:7-8
  - 2. Jesus identified His ministry with the inauguration of God's kingdom. Mk. 1:15
  - 3. He patiently endured suffering before He entered into His glory. Luke 24:25-26
  - 4. Those whom He was appointed to rule initially resisted Him. John 1:10
  - 5. Many who had rejected Him now acknowledge His Lordship. Acts 2:37ff
  - 6. Jesus establishes a New Covenant with His people. v. 3 Ezek. 34:25ff Jer. 31:31ff
  - 7. Jesus fulfils God's promise that David's kingdom would endure forever. 7:13 Rev. 11:15 Mic. 5:2-5a Ezek. 34:11-16,23-24 37:24 Isa. 55:3-4 II Co. 1:20
- C. Have you submitted to God's Anointed King? Ps. 2:6 Heb. 13:20
